And the Two Are Tied in Last Place With the Wilkes-Barre, Who Won from Providence--Buffalo Defeats Rochester--Moving Day Tomorrow.

IN THE FIRST INNING.

Springfield Secured a Lead and Couldn't Be Headed--But Scranton Made a Game Fight.

In the first inning of yesterday's game Springfield was presented with the runs chiefly through Corbett's wildness, though Corbett pitched under the disadvantage of being caught by so small a man as Rafferty. Rafferty was replaced by Outcall toward the last of the inning, and thereafter Corbett pitched a good game, barring his wildness, and batted in three of Scranton's runs.

Ordinarily when a visiting club has eight runs on velvet in the first inning, as had Springfield yesterday, interest begins to lag and the cranks pull for home. But in this case there was bushing of incident and excitement. Incidents while Scranton was pushing in nine runs to Springfield's four and almost winning the game. "Senator" Ward and "Quaker" Reilly, who has been given--not unwisely--the sobriquet of "Dirty" by the bleachers, were kicking from the call of play and they were joined in the music by their playmates. When in the seventh Smith slid spikes first for the plate, tearing two holes in Outcall's leg and straining his knee so that he had to be carried to the bench. A couple of physicians rubbed the limb back into workable shape but the injury put the big fellow out of the game.

BURNS OBJECTED.
Berket was in the dressing-room and in uniform and was the only available candidate for backstop, as Rafferty could not be put back in the game. Manager Burns objected to the move and would not yield to the circumstances of the case. So Captain Hutchinson had to don the protector and his place at first was taken by Johnson.

Meanwhile the wrangling of the players, and Scranton's slow-play for rain early in the contest had been dragging the thing along, and when the nine and a half innings were over, two hours and thirty-five minutes had been consumed. But Scranton had been pushing away at an up-hill argument and pushing in the runs with such regularity that there was a reasonable hope that Springfield would be beaten--and they would have been, by a handsome majority--but for the catastrophe in the first inning.

Umpire Gaffney had his troubles from the start, and with the kicking, delays and close decisions grew gray before the agony was over.

The mistake of selecting so light a man as Rafferty to catch as speedy a one as Corbett was apparent before the game had fairly started, two passed balls and a dropped third strike in less than one full inning showing the Rafferty was in part responsible for Corbett's poor work. But after Outcall put on the mask, Corbett's work showed a sudden improvement and he further redeemed himself by batting in three runs.

TWO PROMISING PLAYERS.
Springfield's work was at no time of the kind that deserved victory. Harley in center and Callopy on second being the only two who put up the kind of a game that will win in the Eastern league. They are both new players. Callopy played his first game yesterday. He lives in Holyoke, Mass., and was with Columbus last season. It is Harley's first professional engagement. He is a product of the Georgetown college team. His was the only star play in yesterday's game, a catch of Corbett's high fly near the fence. His one error was for "footing" the ball.

Scranton scored one in the first on Gilson's single, Harley's fumble and a single by Maguire.

Springfield got nine runs on four bases on balls, a bunt, two singles, a double, Corbett's wild throw over Latham's head, Rafferty's two passed balls and dropped third strike and Eagan's excusable miff after a long run. In the second another was scored on Latham's fumble, a stolen base and Gunson's homer which was muffed by Gilson and rolled under the fence. In the fifth a run was earned on two singles.

Outcall was hurt in the seventh. Gunson singled and went to second on a passed ball. Milligan got a walk and Harley fouled out. Smith singled and muffed the bases. Scheffer was hit by a pitched ball and forced in a run. Callopy hit one to shoot right field which scored Milligan. Smith came tearing down the line from third. O'Brien had made a fine throw in and Outcall, who was standing in the line, received the

ball and touched Smith out as he shot first toward the plate. Although Outcall was hurt so badly that he had to be carried to the bench he was able to walk soon afterward and will be able to accompany the team on the trip. Gilbert's fly ended the inning.

SCRANTON'S GAMEY FIGHT.
With the score 9 to 1 against them, the Scrantonians in the second inning sailed in to win. Two runs were made on singles by Hutch and Eagan, a passed ball and Corbett's single.

In the fourth a force hit, Outcall's single and Corbett's two bager earned a brace of runs.

In the fifth Latham's speed and Gilbert's speed, Corbett's throw, O'Brien's force hit, a base on balls and Milligan's fumble gave two more runs.

In the seventh another was made on two battery errors and Hutchinson's single.

In the eighth singles by Latham and Gilson and errors by Gilbert and Milligan netted Scranton's two final tallies.
