

Washington, D. C., July 23 .- Mail advices from Demerara up to July 8 indicate that the British have not, by any means, abandoned the survey of the road through the disputed territory on the border of Venezuela, and that while the official surveyor, Mr. Harrison, is returning to Georgetown, a special force of 20 armed men under the command of Police Inspector Shaw left Georgetown June 24, under instructions to prothe surveyors.

I. M. Thurn has also been hurried to the Acarabesi to deliver a protest against Venezuelan interferences. It is stated that a force, however, is not to be opposed to force, and in the event of a large body of hostile Venezuelans presenting themselves, the officer in charge has explicit instructions to retire without offering any resistance.

It is stated that at the time of Mr. Harrisons arrest only nine miles of the survey remained to be completed, and extremely probable that the remaining distance has been covered since that time.

Mr. Harirson has not yet arirved at Georgetown, although he was known to be on the way. The Georgetown newspapers say that the policemen were fully equipped with haversacks, hameks, etc., and a hundred rounds of ball cartridges each.




