

Conductor Fox, of the Taylor line, who is one of the most rigid rule followers in the Traction company's employ, was stoned last Friday evening a host of the young element of Taylor. It was about dusk and the car of which Mr. Fox is in charge, was standing at the middle switch in Frogtown the northern extremity of Taylor. There was no one on the car except the conductor and motorman, and the surrounding did not seem to forebode any trouble.

When the down car passed, Conductor Fox gave the signal go ahead. His car, which was an "open" one, had just begun motion, when a fusilade of stones suddenly from the bank on the roadside. It was necessary to do some expert dodging, and the two employes did it. One large cobble, however, hit Conductor Fox on the leg. The motorman put on full speed, and the assaulting party were soon out of harm's reach.






