About three weeks ago she came with her grand-daughter, Miss Amy Green, for a visit, which has thus suddenly ended. She retired in the evening in her usual health, having passed a pleasant afternoon with a number of her friends, but very early in the morning she was taken ill and died of heart failure before the physician could reach the home.

Mrs. Green was seventy-eight years old and leaves two sons and one daughter. The late P. C. Kenyon of Greenfield was her brother. The remains were taken to Providence, R. I., for burial, after a short service at the home, Rev. T. E. Jepson of the Baptist church officiating.

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HINTS TO INVENTORS.

The fee for a caveat is \$10. A patent in Belgium costs \$100. The fee for the issuance of a patent is \$20. All fees of the patent office must be paid in advance. The expense of obtaining a patent in Switzerland is \$100. The patent office of Great Britain does not require models. All German patent claims must be taken out for an invention or discovery. The fee for filing each original application for a patent is \$15. A German patent covers Prussia and all the states of the German empire. A Belgium patent lasts 20 years, provided that it is worked in Belgium. A German patent costs \$100, this sum covering also the tax for six years. Any new or useful art, machine, manufacture or method may be patented. Inventions are usually taken out for improvements of inventions already patented. A caveat may be filed in Canada just as in the United States, the entire expense being \$20. A Spanish patent covers Spain and all the Spanish colonies that are not held by insurgents. In Russia a patent may be taken out at the pleasure of the patentee, for three, five or ten years. A German patent must be worked in that country within three years from its date or it becomes void. Any new or original design for the printing of silk, cotton, woolen or other fabrics may be patented. All patents are issued in the name and under the seal of the United States and of the patent office. The patents are assignable by law, and an interest in a patent may be assigned as easily as the whole. The cost of an application for a British patent is \$50, which includes government tax and all expenses. The fee in design cases for three years and six months is \$10; for seven years, \$15; for ten years, \$20. A new and useful shape or configuration of an article of manufacture entitles the inventor to a patent right. The fee for the patent is \$100, which must be signed by the inventor and attested by the signatures of two witnesses. Any new or useful improvement upon a machine, manufacture or device not previously known may be patented. A French patent must be prior to patents taken out in other countries, otherwise the application will not be granted. Improvement upon a patent in France may at any time be made by the inventor upon the payment of a small fee. The fee for the patent for certified copies of patents and other papers in manuscript or typewritten is 5 cents per 100 words. The French government makes no official examination of the device for which a patent is asked, and requires no models. In Canada models of patents are not required unless specially asked for by the Canadian commissioner of patents. A French patent is issued for 15 years and is subject to an annual tax of \$20. The first applicant for an invention or device receives the patent in Great Britain, whether he be the real inventor or not. Collaborators who jointly have invented a device are entitled to a joint patent. Neither can claim one separately from the other. All applications for issuance of letters patent must be made in writing to the commissioner of patents at Washington city, St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
