

MARKETS AND STOCKS

Wall Street Review.

New York, Aug. 4.-In the first fifteen minutes of business at the Stock Exchange the market was active and excited. Prices dropped anywhere from 1 to 3% per cent, under heavy offerings for both accounts. The demoralization was due to the announcement of the failure of Moore Bros', of Chicago, The firm had ben intimately connected with the Diamond Match company and the New York Biscuit company and their suspension was a great surprise here. The report that the liabilities of the concern were \$20,000,000 was not generally credited. New York has had very a visit to friends in Connecticut, have little interest in the shares of the Diamond Match company, which, it is understood, brought about the embarrassment of the Moores and after the break at the opening in the western railroad and industrial issues, local operators were inclined to take a calme view of the situation. The failure will undoubtedly have some influence on the money market later on and to this extent it will be reflected in stocks. Today call loans were worth 3634 per cent, at one time, but near the borrowers were accommodated at 1462 per cent. In time loans bankers have raised their rates to 614 per cent. and the commercial paper market is decidedly stiffer. 




