Recovering from their momentary surprise the young men of the party jumped from the wagon and rushed to the field from whence the stones came. The guilty parties, however, had fled, and were discovered smacking behind some bushes and were at once pursued. Two of them were overtaken and were dealt with summarily which they will long remember. Before letting them go the young men took the names of the two, which were given as Morrison and O'Leary. They said that a man had hired them to stone the rig.

The young criminals were brought and the party returned to this city with the young girls, Miss Mary Edwards, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Edwards of Olyphant, still unconscious. She was restored, upon regaining this city, and the party resumed their journey. Detective Michael Moran is now investigating for the loss and should very soon tell you who and where a gunplay charge to appear.
