Company Begins Mining Coal in the Ill-Fated Mine.

Mining operations were resumed in the ill-fated Twin shaft mine at Pittston on Monday. Nearly fifty cars were hoisted during the day.

Concerning the abandonment of the attempt to reach the bodies a committee of the widows of the victims visited the company offices Monday.
