BURT ARRESTED.

Will Be Held for the Murder of His Wife and Children.

Chicago, Aug.' 18 .- Eugene Burt, a young man of apparently 22 years of age, was arrested in the Rialto building at ten o'clock this morning charged with the murder of his wife and two children in Austin, Tex. Burt, who is a traveling salesman, returned home from a trip about six weeks ago. After a serious quarrel with his wife they retired to rest, having seemingly settled their difficulty. In the morning the bed room of the couple was found in a state of disorder, and blood was scattered all around. The bodies were missing and the place was searched After a fruitless search for some time the bodies of the wife and two children

were found in the cistern. A posse was organized immediately the surrounding country was searched for Burt, but he had succeed-ed in escaping on a freight train. Until today nothing has been heard of
