He came to blows with some one in the saloon and he was hustled out. Then, on the streets, he pummelled a harmless individual and as Patrolman Peters was approaching him Jones ran down the street.

It was a grand race. When Jones was placed in the station house he immediately began to tear down the bars of the cell. He was furious and was finally chained to the bars.

WAS VAN HORN HERE?

During the early hours yesterday morning the West Side police were on the lookout for Van Horn, the murderer. He was supposed to be on this side. Helmes, an old gentleman, Hiram thought he saw Van Horn, and Helmes' story, as told to the police, caused much excitement and a thorough search. Helmes keeps a boarding house in Hennessy court, in the near of North Main avenue, near the Salvation Army barracks. About two years ago Van Horn Hampton Street Methodist Episcopal boarded for a long period at this house and the proprietor is well acquainted with the murderer. As Helmes was coming down Main avenue at 10 o'clock Sunday evening he saw a man standing at the top of a stairway in a passage which leads to the Helmes house and is used by the boarders. When Helmes saw the man he advanced toward him and, placing his hand on the supposed murderer's shoulder, he ex-claimed: "Hello, George!" According to Helmes' story to the police, the man made no response but hastily went down the steps and into the passage. Then it was that Helmes gave the alarm. The police officers hurried to the premises. out, though a long inspection was made, no suspicious individual was seen. Helmes is positive that the man was Van Horn. He says that the murderer has shaved his mustache and has had his hair clipped.
