**GRAND JURY WAS** A RECORD BREAKER

Made Its Final Report to Court Saturday and Was Discharged.

A BIG BATCH OF IGNORED BILLS

**Total Number of Cases Considered by** the Jury 653, of Which 205 Were Returned Marked True and 448 Ignored -- Report Which Accompanied the Final Findings of the Jury.

Saturday morning the grand jury made its final return to court and was discharged by Judge Edwards with words of commendation for the faith-ful service performed.

The jury was a record breaker in every respect. Saturday's return con-sisted of nine true and 247 ignored bills, making a total of 205 true and 448 ignor-ed bills returned by the jury.
