SENATOR QUAYS WORK DOWN SOUTH

Mr. Bryan Will Hear the Results in November.

SOME TIMELY CAMPAIGN LABOR

Republicans Have Been at Work White Bryan was Exhibiting Himself in the East--Their Congress Committee Banks on 200 Sound-Money Representatives.

New York, Oct. 4.—Senator Quay telegraphed from his home in Beaver yesterday that he would be at Republican headquarters in New York Monday morning. On Monday and Tuesday there will be important meetings of the executive committee and a general round-up of affairs before Chairman Hanna's departure for the seat of war at Chicago.

Senator Quay is familiar with the workings of the campaign in all of the southern states, and he has given particular attention to the fight in Kentucky, Tennessee, West Virginia, Georgia and Delaware and Maryland. He is an adept in carrying on campaigns in states of this character.

ONE RESULT. One result of Senator Quay's negotiations, with which Chairman Hanna has been fully familiar, has been the withdrawal of the Higgins electors in the State of Delaware.

THE DEPARTURE OF SENATOR QUAY from headquarters just as Bryan started on his speaking tour in the border states (above already mentioned above), came up yesterday in a discussion with Chairman Hanna, who positively declined to tell what Senator Quay had been up to. Chairman Hanna added: "Everything will be known at the proper time, but there would be little sense in talking about such matters at this time."

IT IS POSITIVELY KNOWN, HOWEVER, that the Republicans are banking on capturing most of the aforesaid States, and that Bryan and Populistic Chairman Jones, not forgetting Senator Gorman, are fearful of the results in these States. This much is positively known. While Bryan was tramping through the New England states the Republican National managers were putting in heavy work in those border states.

CHAIRMAN BYNUM ABSENT. Important Business Requires His Departure from Chicago. Chicago, Oct. 4.—Chairman Bynum, of the National Democratic executive committee, left for the east last night. Rumors have been rife that Friday's committee meeting was far from harmonious and that the appointment of ex-Mayor Hopkins as vice-chairman, to have charge of headquarters in the absence of Mr. Bynum, was a virtual detestment of the Indiana leader.

BISHOP KEANE HAS RESIGNED

No Longer at the Head of the Great Catholic University.

RETIRES AT THE POPE'S REQUEST

Will Be Elevated to the Rank of Archbishop in Recognition of Meritorious Service--Welcomes Release from Duties Beyond His Strength.

Washington, Oct. 4.—Bishop John J. Keane, rector of the Catholic University of America, located here, has resigned at the request of Pope Leo XIII. The news, which has been published here today, is an unauthorized and somewhat inaccurate form, was entirely unexpected, and caused much comment in Catholic circles.

I shall now enjoy some months of greatly needed rest on the Pacific coast, leaving all plans for the future to a later date."

WEYLER'S LAST FAILURE.

Cannot Succeed in Trapping or Defeating Maceo--Experiences Much Trouble in Muzzling the Press.

New York, Oct. 4.—A special dispatch to the Herald from Havana, Cuba, October 3, via Key West, Fla., says: General Weyler's military operations in inaugurating the campaign in the extreme west, intended to trap Maceo or defeat and drive him east, have proved a failure.

FALSE REPORT DENIED. London, Oct. 4.—The United Associated Presses is in a position to state that a report circulated last night by Reuters' Telegram company that P. T. Ryan, the alleged dynamiter, had been released by the French authorities, and that he was on his way to the United States, is absolutely without foundation. The French officials have not yet decided what disposition shall be made of his case.

Plotted Against Spain. Barcelona, Oct. 4.—The Spanish steamer Isla de Panay has arrived from Manila. On board of her as a prisoner was Dr. Rizal, who is believed to have been the promoter of the revolt against Spanish authority in the Philippine islands. He will be confined in the Manjilak prison here.

MONEY IN THE NATIONAL BANKS

Interesting Report Made by Comptroller of the Currency Eckles.

RESULTS OF AN INVESTIGATION

A Conservative Estimate Shows an Increase of About Half a Million and Makes the Total Deposits Over Five Billions of Dollars--Total Number of Depositors.

Washington, Oct. 4.—Comptroller of the Currency Eckles has issued a statement of an investigation made by him of the amount of money held by the banks of the country. The number of banking houses and trust companies required were 12,982 and 77 clearing houses, covering all in the country. Reports were received but from 5,723 banks and trust companies and 66 clearing house associations. The information, however, is of such a character as to enable a fair average to be made from all the approximated. Of the 5,723 reports received, 3,458 were of national banks, 1,491 state banks, 457 savings banks, 230 private banks, and 84 of loan and trust companies. PROTECTION FOR ARMENIANS.

The Powers Have at Last Agreed Upon a Plan of Operation.

London, Oct. 4.—The Daily Mail will tomorrow publish a despatch from Vienna confirming the report that the powers have agreed upon a pacific settlement of the eastern question honorable to all the parties concerned and amply guaranteeing the future security of the Armenians. The despatch adds that the leading foreign governments are in favor of a Christian zone on the basis of life and poverty will be assured the Armenians by the powers, and some of them any necessary active operations to be undertaken by Great Britain, France and Russia and, perhaps, Italy.

EASTERN SITUATION.

The Sultan Would Like to Expel Armenians from Bnignaria. London, Oct. 4.—The Constantinople representative of the United Associated Presses telegraphs that the Porte will request the Bulgarian government to expel all unemployed Armenians from the country. The request will be based on the ground that idle Armenians assembled in the Sofia and other large towns of Bulgaria and conspire against the Sultan. From their request being serious, the Sultan's residence on Thursday, Twenty Sofias, theological students, desired to obtain an audience of the Sultan. From their request being refused they attempted to force themselves into the presence of his majesty. The troops who were on duty prevented their entrance, but in doing so killed three of the Sofias. The others were arrested.
