THIRD DAY OF THE COUNTY INSTITUTE

Many New Ideas Advanced for the Benefit of Teachers.

PAPERS READ IN THE MORNING

Were Heard by the Teachers of the Intermediate and Primary Departments—The Discussion on Them, Superintendent Coughlin, Dr. Pratt and Dr. Holbrook Instructors in the Afternoon—Directors Meet Today.

Professor Redway, Superintendent Coughlin, Dr. Pratt and Dr. Holbrook occupied the greater part of the time at yesterday's sessions of the county teachers' institute.

The morning session opened with the singing of "Ever be Happy and Gay" which was followed by a talk on singing, by Professor Cogswell.

Considerable Amount of Business Was Transacted Yesterday.

NEXT MEETING IN WEISSPORT

Vote of Thanks Tended to Rev. Zieselman and the Members of His Congregation—Next Sunday School Convention Will Convene at Butler, This State—Resolutions Adopted. Notes About Members of Conference.

The conference of the Lutheran ministers of the Wilkes-Barre district, which began Monday evening in Zion Lutheran church, Millin avenue, came to a close yesterday afternoon.

The session yesterday morning was called to order promptly at 9 o'clock by Rev. Lindenstruth, the chairman, and devotional services were conducted by Rev. Fogley, of Sayre.

Discussion ensued on the filling of the synod's different boards at its next meeting. Rev. H. H. Bruning, of White Haven, was elected treasurer of the special jubilee fund.

Rev. J. H. Kuder presented a strong paper on synodical finance and suggested some very important changes. The following resolutions were adopted:

1. Synod shall decide the amount of money to be raised by each conference.

2. Each conference shall have a special committee which shall meet as soon as possible after each annual meeting of the synod to apportion the amount apportioned to the conference among the different parishes.

3. That each conference shall at its spring meeting ascertain whether the past year's collection has been sufficient to meet its needs, and if not, the delinquent parishes shall be reported, and if necessary, disallowed.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES. A missionary committee to co-operate with the synodical Board of Home Missions consists of Revs. Bruning and Fogley and Messrs. Weitz and Scheib.

The audit committee reported a deficit of \$17.50. The missionary exploration committee reported progress and did some important pioneer work.

The mission festival committee was re-appointed. A very successful Sunday school convention was held at Hazleton.

The next Sunday school convention of the district will be held at St. John's church, Butler, Pa., of which Rev. Lindenstruth is pastor.

The morning session was adjourned with prayer by Rev. E. Stettler, of Gouldsboro.

Rev. Lauer, of Lansford, opened the afternoon session of the conference occupied most of the time and were discussed at length by the several pastors.

The conclusions arrived at were on the whole very definite.

A cordial invitation to hold the spring conference at Weissport was accepted, and after a vote of thanks was tendered to Rev. Zieselman and the congregation of Zion church the conference adjourned by the use of the regular service.

NOTES OF CONFERENCE. Rev. Frederick Holter, of Christ church, South Side, will move to Jersey City next week.

Rev. Holter deprecatingly steps up higher. He will inaugurate a prominent congregation in Christ church held him long as he did because the synod liberally supported him at \$50 per year besides the support of his congregation, which now numbers upwards of 300 communicant members.

Among the members of the conference are Rev. Lauer, of Lansford, an able preacher, with an impressive appearance, and Rev. Ehinger, of Carbondale.

Revs. Fogley, Traubert, Ettwein and Seneker are some of the ready debaters and able church parliamentarians.

Rev. C. J. Cooper, financial agent of Muhlenberg college, Allentown, and Messrs. Kawalla and Tavel, both members of the district synod, were in attendance and presented their respective causes with ability.

Revs. Zieselman and E. A. Bauer, of Jersey City, were the guests of this conference. Father Zieselman is 72 years old and knew Scranton when Scranton was not yet. Although he has several children, he has no active interest in the family, he took an active interest in the work of the church and moved around his fellow ministers in a happy spirit and with the brightness of a young man.

Father Bauer met with an accident some months ago, and was unavoidably absent.

Revs. Strauss, Ritter and Kuntz are known by conference as the joyous men, and they will long be remembered for the many good things they did for the welfare of the church.

At the service on Tuesday evening in Zion's church the speakers were Revs. C. J. Cooper, Strauss and Cooper. The addresses were interesting and highly appreciated.

The Pennsylvania-German idiom afforded much amusement and interest. Rev. Zieselman's people, many of whom are pure classical German in the pulpit and upon the street.
