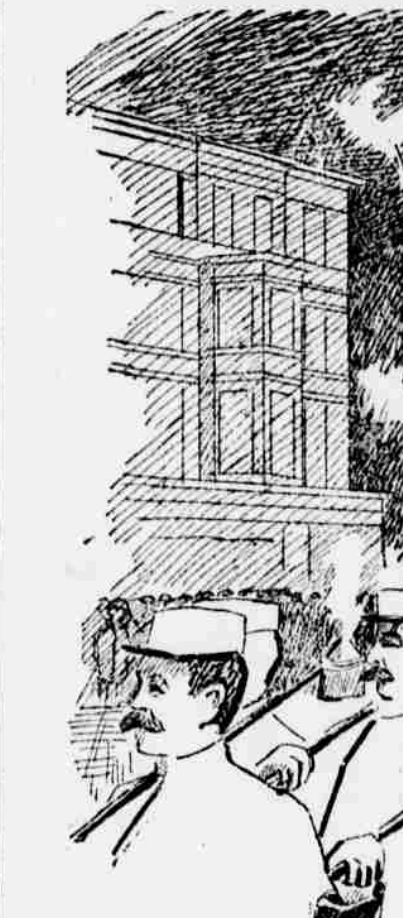
RAILROAD MEN ARE FOR SOUND MONEY

Lackawanna Employes Have a Big Demonstration.

OVER FIFTEEN HUNDRED IN LINE

Conductors, Brakemen, Engineers, Firemen, Shop Hands and Clerks from this City and Nearby Places Along the Line Join in a Monster Parade in this City—Serenade Tendered William Connell—Paraders Cheered at Every Turn.

Over fifteen hundred Delaware, Lackawanna and Western employes marched Saturday night under the banner of sound money and protection. It was the largest and most magnificent political demonstration ever given in this city by one particular class of workmen.

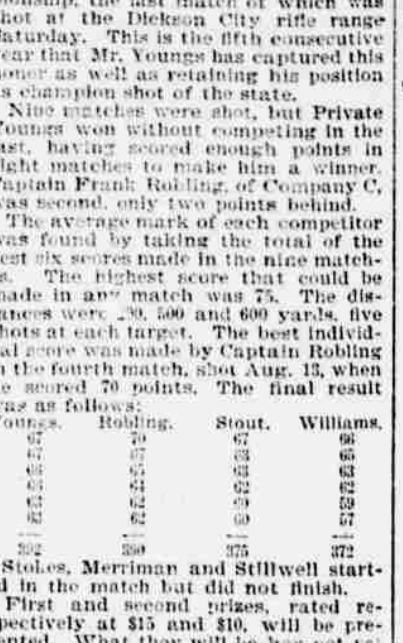
