THE DEMOCRATIC CHAIRMAN TALKS

Views of Senator James K. Jones Upon the Situation.

SOME PLANS FOR RAISING REVENUE

He Would Increase the Tax on Beer by 50 Cents--Believes That the Poor Man Should Enjoy Tobacco Unmolested--Is a Trifle Hazy on the Income Tax--Explains the Success of Major McKinley.

Washington, Nov. 23.--Senator James K. Jones, chairman of the national committee, reached Washington this afternoon and will remain here until congress adjourns.

"I have no idea," said Senator Jones, answering a question in regard to the probable legislation of the approaching session of congress, "that anything will be done aside from passing the usual appropriation bills."

Discussing plans for raising revenue, Senator Jones advanced several interesting propositions. "Many of the proposals," he said, "do not support ed McKinley will doubtless be surprised at the character of the bill that will be presented to the country."

WOULD TAX BEER. "For myself, I should support and vote for a bill increasing the tax on beer by 50 cents."

"As to the income tax, I have not examined the decision of the supreme court with a view to determining whether or not a measure could be passed which would produce revenue for that source without waiting for an amendment to the constitution."

"What will be the policy of the Democratic committee, Senator? Will it continue the fight as the Republican committee are reported to have since led to do, by maintaining headquarters in the interim between campaigns and educating the people by the issue of literature?"

"When the people of the United States have expressed their opinion directly upon the question of restoring silver to the position it occupied prior to 1873, the platform of the Republican convention was a straight gold standard, but only for its maintenance until bimetalism could be secured by international agreement."

"I am firmly convinced that a vast majority of the people of this country desire bimetalism, and if the Republicans place themselves squarely in line for the gold standard, and the use of silver as subsidiary coinage only, there can be no doubt of the result of the contest."

Five Years for Weatherly.

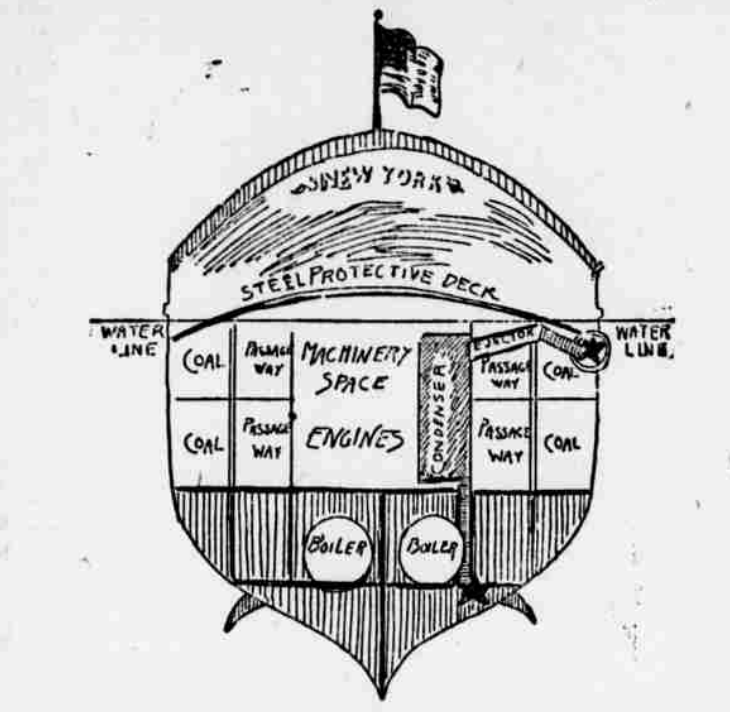

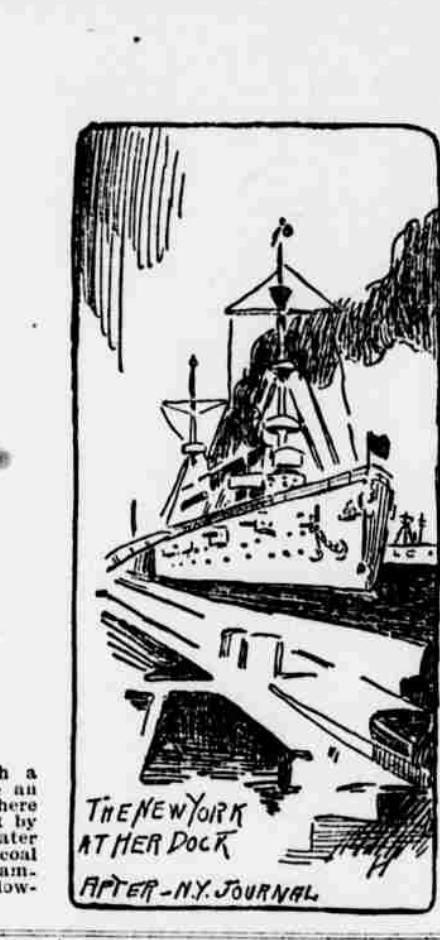

DEDICATION OF NEW JERSEY'S SHAFT

The Interesting Exercises at Chattanooga Military Park. AN ARTISTIC MEMORIAL UNVEILED

Some of the Leading Sons of the State Have Their Pictures Taken at the Base of the Beautiful Monument. Impromptu Addresses Made.
