PREPARING FOR THE INAUGURATION

Imposing Ceremonies Will Be Features of the Event.

THE HAPPINESS OF MARK HANNA

He Becomes Jovial When Inter-viewed and Refuses to Give Out Information--Major McKinley Receives Many Callers--Conference with Senator Sherman and Nelson Dingley.

Cleveland, O., Dec. 3.--Mark Hanna looked happy this afternoon. He said that he felt happy. He had just returned from a two days' conference with McKinley. He was asked whether you are to be the next secretary of the treasury or the next senator from Ohio to succeed Senator Sherman.

"Never mind what it will be. You newspaper fellows are smart, and I will fool you all yet." He refused to throw any light on what he meant by the remark only to say that he knew what he was talking about, and that it would all come to pass in due time.

When asked about his proposed Washington trip he said: "I will leave for the capital Friday noon. One of the chief objects of my visit will be to arrange for the inauguration ceremonies. If present indications augur anything I believe that the pomp and splendor attending McKinley's inauguration will be the grandest ever seen."

"Will you hold any important conferences?" "I will have several consultations with leading Republicans. Will likely meet Senators Sherman, Quay, Proctor and others. Cannot say who the other will probably be."

"Has Mr. McKinley determined to call a special session of congress?" "Not yet. It is a little early to decide definitely on that point. There are too many other matters to be decided before reaching any definite conclusion on that score. I do not know whether a special session of congress will be called or not."

McKINLEY'S MANY CALLERS. Canton, O., Dec. 3.--Major McKinley discussed many questions with many men today. His first extended interview was with Senator J. M. Thurston, of Nebraska, who told him about the situation in the west and discussed at some length the probable course of congress this winter.

Major McKinley then had a pleasant chat with Mr. Charlton, member of the Canadian parliament, who had some interesting suggestions to make on the subject of reciprocity and of establishing closer commercial relations between this country and Canada.

Hon. W. E. Mason was the next caller. His call was a purely personal one and he stated to Major McKinley that he was a candidate for the senate of the United States and only asked for treatment from his opponent.

Nelson A. Dingley, of Maine, and his son were the next callers. Major McKinley had a long talk with Mr. Dingley and Senator Thurston participated in a part of the conference.

Late in the afternoon Senators Mitchell and McBride and Representative Herrmann of Oregon called and had pleasant chats with him. Senators Thurston and Mitchell left for Washington this evening. Mr. Dingley expects to set out for the capital Friday afternoon. General Stuart L. Woodford stopped off on his way to Chicago to pay his respects to the president-elect, and dined with Major and Mrs. McKinley tonight.

Representative R. W. Taylor, of this district, arrived from Washington this afternoon. He has the opinion prevailing at the capital that Senator Sherman had decided to become an active candidate for re-election to the senate of the United States.

Another caller bound for Washington today was Representative Johnson, of North Dakota.

NO CABINET MAKING. There was no cabinet making today. Major McKinley talked with the visitors, whom he took into his confidence on questions of public and party policy. Senator McBride, of Oregon, thinks his state is entitled to recognition in the cabinet and has been making suggestions to the president-elect.

Some of the Grand Army men talk of urging Mr. McKinley to appoint General Clarkson for a cabinet position, but it is not at all likely that Nebraska will be recognized in this way.

BLIZZARD'S FIRST VICTIM

Aged Manitowish Frozen on His Way to His Son's Home. Winnipeg, Dec. 3.--The first death from the blizzard in Manitoba was recorded today. The aged father of George Crawford, of Manitowish, reached that place on Monday from What Cheer, Ia., and started to walk to his son's farm, about four miles distant.

The cold was very severe and the old man was evidently overcome and took shelter in a snow bank, where his corpse was found today.

BELIEVES IN SHORT SESSION.

Vice-President Stevenson Declines to Talk Politics. Washington, Dec. 3.--Vice President Stevenson was in his room at the capital today preparing for the session that will open Monday.

Mr. Stevenson declined to talk politics or predict what the possible course of legislation this session would be, further than to remark that he believed the short session would compel congress to give considerable of its time to the appropriation bills.

PROMOTIONS AT THE VATICAN.

Rev. E. F. Prendergast Appointed Titular Bishop of Scillio. Rome, Dec. 3.--In the published announcements of the proceedings of the papal consistory at the Vatican today, it is stated that Rev. E. F. Prendergast, of Philadelphia, has been appointed titular bishop of Scillio and Mr. Martinelli, papal delegate to the United States has been confirmed in the rank and title of Archbishop of Ephesus.

WEDDING OF THE BRIDE.

He Weds a Lady Who Bore the Unromantic Name of Hicks. Philadelphia, Dec. 3.--E. H. Sothern, the actor, who, with his company, is filling an engagement in a local theater, was quietly married here today to Virginia M. Hicks (Virginia Harned), the actress. The engagement of Mr. Sothern and Miss Harned was but recently announced, but it was said that the wedding would not take place for some time. Miss Harned, who is at present without an engagement, came here quietly from New York today and her wedding with Mr. Sothern was the result of the trip.

The ceremony took place at St. Mary's Protestant Episcopal church and the only persons present were Mrs. Carl Sothern, a sister of the bride, and Mr. Samuel Sothern, a brother of Mr. Sothern.

THE POPE DISPLEASED.

He Does Not Like the Gossip Over Bishop Keane's Removal. Washington, Dec. 3.--The flood of gossip following the deposition of Bishop Keane from the see of Philadelphia, appearing in the American newspapers, has reached Rome and has caused grave concern. It is said that the unusual step taken by the cardinal secretary of state in sending the following cablegram received this afternoon at the apostolic legation here:

Washington, Dec. 3.--The Holy Father has learned with great sorrow of the agitation created in the United States by pretended correspondence and telegrams from Rome announcing measures soon to be taken against eminent American prelates and distinguished professors of the Catholic university. Your excellency will authoritatively deny all such falsehoods, which look like the product of reprehensible machinations.

A Catholic churchman well versed with all the steps leading up to Bishop Keane's removal said tonight, that the action of the holy father in sending the cablegram above quoted, should put a stop to all further gossip on the subject. It was well understood, he said, in church circles, that Bishop Keane's removal was brought about by German ecclesiastical influence and it was hoped the same influence would further charges in the same direction and follow the same lines would follow. While he deprecated sensational newspaper talk, in this instance, it seemed to him to have been exaggerated, as it had reached the ears of Rome, which had called a halt on the assault being made by the German ecclesiastical on the American party of the Catholic church in America. The American party, he said, had not lifted a finger to repel such assaults, nor had it sent tales to Rome, but simply abided its time, with the result that the holy father had now taken the matter in his own hand.

SOMALIS MASSACRE WHITES.

Italian Consul at Zanzibar and Six Officers Killed. Zanzibar, Dec. 3.--The massacre of Senator Cecchi, the Italian consul here, the captains of the Italian warship Volturro and Staffette, and about six Italian sailors, was reported tonight from Magadodo, on the coast of Somaliland, East Africa, occurred on Saturday last, Nov. 28. The party was accompanied by several Italian soldiers and was on its way to the country outside of Magadodo, when the Somalis attacked the Italians, killed all the whites and also killed thirty of the Askaris.

Reminiscences from Zanzibar giving additional details of the massacre of Senator Cecchi, the Italian consul, and the Italian officers who were with him at Magadodo. Somaliland state that fourteen Italians were killed. The caravan was attacked during the night by the Somalis. The latter were repulsed at first, but rallied and continually attacked the retreating caravan. The Italians and their escort to Askaris fought desperately, but were eventually overcome. The bodies of the slain were found in a pile.

MAHER WANTS TO FIGHT.

Will Meet Sharkey for \$5,000 a Side. Pittsburg, Pa., Dec. 3.--Peter Maher would like to fight Tom Sharkey, John J. Quinn, manager for the Irishman, said tonight that Maher would fight Sharkey for \$5,000 a side and the best of both.

"If Maher don't put out Sharkey in ten rounds," said Quinn, "the saloon can take all the money."

If Sharkey refuses to accept the above offer, Maher's backers are willing to make a match with Corbett or Fitzsimmons for a finish fight, or a limited round "go" for any amount of money and the best purse offered.

THE TEXAS GOOD AS NEW.

Brooklyn, N. Y., Dec. 3.--The battle-ship Texas, which was damaged by a dry dock about two weeks ago for repairs, came out of the dock today, and her officers and crew were met by a band of music. She was now as good as new.

The ship will be put in commission on the 10th.

Famine in India.

London, Dec. 3.--The Globe publishes a news agency dispatch from Bombay saying that the mortality in the districts of Belgaum and Helangal districts is steadily increasing. Hundreds of persons have died from starvation in the Gode district.

The American Hog Tabooed.

Paris, Dec. 3.--A mass meeting of the Farmers' union was held in Lyons today at which the dealers in salt meats resolved in favor of the exclusion of American pork products, in view of the fall in the price of swine.

Storm at Chatham.

Chatham, Mass., Dec. 3.--A heavy north-east storm has been prevailing here since last night, accompanied by snow and sleet, making navigation over Nantucket Shoals extremely dangerous.

Cadets Appointed.

Washington, Dec. 3.--Among the cadet appointments to the West Point Military Academy is that of Charles M. Eby, Newport, Pa., with P. E. Smith, of Annapolis, Pa., as alternate.

Mrs. Mink Dead.

Watertown, N. Y., Dec. 3.--Mrs. Sarah C. Mink, late national president of the Woman's Relief corps, died here this morning.

WEYLER'S CAMPAIGN A COMPLETE FAILURE

With Sixty Thousand Men at Hand He Can Accomplish Nothing.

THE EXECUTION OF LOPEZ COLOMA

More of the Shocking Details Come to Light--General Weyler's Part in the Affair--Spanish Scouts Unable to Locate the Enemy at Pinar Del Rio.

Key West, Fla., Dec. 3.--Passengers who arrived from Havana last night report that Weyler's campaign in Pinar Del Rio so far is a complete failure, despite the fact that he has sixty thousand men in the province. When Weyler left Artemisa he formed a column of 10,000 infantry, 1,500 cavalry and ten pieces of artillery and marched skirting the base of the hills on the southern side, and seeking an opening to attack Maceo, who is strongly fortified on top of the hills. It appears that Maceo has gathered all his forces and is now entrenched in the hills waiting Weyler's attack. There is, it is asserted, no truth in the report that Maceo has dispersed his forces into small bands to elude combats, and it is further declared that it is known on authority that General Weyler has no view of meeting Maceo with a large force.

There are more shocking details of Lopez's execution. General Weyler's part in the affair is indignant at the injustice committed in executing Coloma. Campos obtained the queen's pardon for Coloma and sent a telegram so advising. The message arrived at night, but Weyler pocketed it so report says, and ordered the execution to proceed and Coloma was shot at 5 p. m.

There is great interest in Havana concerning President Cleveland's forthcoming message and the action of congress on the Cuban situation. The Spaniards and Cubans alike are anxiously awaiting the results.

THE QUEEN PRESIDES.

Madrid, Dec. 3.--The queen regent presided at a meeting of the cabinet council today at which Premier Canovas announced the arrival of General Philippon, the new governor of the Philippines. The premier also announced that the insurgent leader, Maceo, had disappeared from his position in the Cuban province of Pinar Del Rio and that the Spanish troops under General Weyler were pursuing him.

Havana, Dec. 3.--The expectation of a decisive battle between the rebels and the troops under command of General Weyler has not been allayed by the return to the front from Havana. General Weyler has had no engagement with the insurgents. In fact, the Spaniards have not been able to locate the enemy, and the position is unknown of a single one of the rebel leaders. The last report received here is that the rebels are still in the mountains, and are being camped near Los Palacios. The condition of General Gonzalez Munoz, who recently returned to Havana after a short absence, has become worse, and fears are entertained that he will not recover.

LIKE RATS IN A TRAP.

Three Hundred Spaniards Shot Down by Cubans--Attack on Guanabacoa More Serious Than Reported.

Havana, Dec. 3.--The facts which are just leaking out in regard to the insurgent attack on Guanabacoa, on the outskirts of this city, on Tuesday last, show the affair to have been much more serious than at first stated. The insurgents, who numbered about 1,000 men, were camped near Los Palacios. The condition of General Gonzalez Munoz, who recently returned to Havana after a short absence, has become worse, and fears are entertained that he will not recover.

NATIONAL DEMOCRACY.

The Gold Democrats Organize at the Hoffman House. New York, Dec. 3.--A meeting of the national Democracy--gold Democrats--was held tonight in the ball room of the Hoffman House. About 125 members of the party were present.
