Wheat rose to the close last week, but gradually reacted and broke pressed business failed to support all sharply on Friday, closing 2% cents lower for the week. The volume of business shown by clearing house returns was for the past week nearly 1 per cent, over last year and for the month of November 3 per cent, and 11 per cent. less than 1892, the comparison being the best for the past five months.


