GREAT REDUCTION IN THE FAILURES

The Decline of Forty Per Cent Gives Ground for Confidence. MANY NEW BUILDINGS AND BRIDGES Several Thousand Car Loads of Iron Have Been Ordered for New York. Better Demand for Anthracite Will Follow the Revival of Manufacturing Industries.

New York, Dec. 4.—R. G. Dun & Co. will say tomorrow in their weekly review of trade: The classified failures for November, given today show gratifying reduction compared with October, and are especially important as showing the recent disturbance during the presidential campaign, which swelled failures \$36,000,000 in September but did not prevent a quick return to the monthly average scarcely greater than that of May.

Ground for confidence is also found in the abandonment of two of the largest combinations by which the iron industry has been retarded and the possibility that two others will be abandoned. Such a state of things within a month after the election suggests that these organizations, formed when a depressed business fails to support all the works in existence, are not expected to survive a general revival and better demand for products.
