They viewswith wonder and admiration the cheerful resolution with which vast bodies of men are sent across thousands of miles of ocean, and an enormous debt accumulated, that the costly possession of the Gem of the Antilles may still additis place in the Spanish crown. And yet neither the government nor the people of the United States have shut their eyes to the course of events in Cuba, or have failed to realize the existence of conceded grievances, which have led to the present revolt from the authority of Spaingrievances recognized by the queen regent and by the Cortes, volced by the most patriotic and enlightened of Spanish statesmen, without regard to party, and demonstrated by reforms proposed by the executive and approved by the legislative branch of the Spanish government. It is in the assumed temper and disposition of the Spanish government to remedy these grievances, fortified by indications of influential public opinion in Spain, that this government has hoped to discover the most promising and effective means of composing the present strife, with horor and advantage to Spain and with the achievement of all the reasonable objects of the insurrection.

It would seem that if Spain should offer It would seem that if Spain should offer to Cuba genuine autonomy—a measure of home rule which, while preserving the sovereignty of Spain, would satisfy all rational requirements of her Spainish subjects—there should be no just reason why the pacification of the Island might not be effected on that basis. Such a result would aguear to be in the true interest of all concerned, It would at once stop the conflict which is now consuming the resources of the Island and making it worthless for whichever party may ultimately prevail. It would keep intact the possessions of Spain without touching her honor, which will be consulted rather than impugned by the adequate redress of admitted grievances. It would put the prosperity of the Island and the fortunes of the lababitants within their own control.

It should be added that it can not be reasonably assumed that the hitherto expectant attitude of he United States will be indefinitely maintained. While we are anxious to accord all due respect to the sovereignty of Spain, we can not view the pending conflict in all its features, and properly apprehend our inevitably close relations to it, and its possible results, without considering that by the course of events we may be drawn into such an unusual and unprecedented condition, as will fix a limit to our patient waiting for Spain to end the contest, either alone and in her own way, or with our friendly cooperation.

when a hopeless struggle for its re-establishment has degenerated into a strife which means nothing more than the userless sacrifice of human life and the utter destruction of the very subject-matter of the conflict, a situation will be presented in which our obligations to the sovereignty of Soaln will be superseded by higher obligations, which we san hardly hesitate to recognize and discharge. Deferring the choice of ways and methods until the time for action arrives, we should make them depend upon the precise conditions then existing; and they should not be determined upon without giving careful heed to every consideration involving our honor and interest, or the international duty we owe to Spain. Until we face the contingencies suggested, or the situation is by other incidents imperatively changed, we should continue in the line of conduct heretofore pursued, thus in all circumstances exhibiting our obedience to the requirements of public law and our regard for the duty enjoined upon us by the position we occupy in the family of nations.

A contemplation of emergencies that may arise should plainly lead us to avoid their creation, either through a careless disregard of present duty or even an undue stimulation and ill-timed expression of feeling. But I have deemed it not amiss to remind the congress that a time may arrive when a correct policy and care for our interests, as well as a regard for the interests of other nations and their citizens, joined by considerations of humanity and a desire to see a rich and fertile country, intimately related to us saved from complete devastation, will contrain our government to such action as will subserve the interests thus involved and at the same time promise to Cuba and its inhabitants an opportunity to enjoy the blessings of peace.

The Venezuelan boundary question has ceased to be a matter of difference between Great Britain and the United States, their respective governments having agreed the substantial provisions of a treaty between Great Britain and Venezuela submitting the whole controversy to arbitration. The provisions of the treaty are so eminently just and fair, that the assent of Venezuela thereto may confidently be anticipated.

Negotiations for a treaty of general arbitration for all differences between Great Britain and the United States are far advanced and promise to reach a successful culmination at an early date.

fiscal year ended on the thirtieth day of June, 1895, was \$1,228,35,055, of which \$599.. 597,964 was in gold, and \$628,728,071 in sliver.

On the first day of Nevember, 1896, the total stock of money of all kinds in the country was \$2,284,40,590, and the amount in circulation, not including that in the treasury holdings, was \$1,627,655,564, being \$22,63 per capita upon an estimated population of 71,902,000.

The production of the precious metals in the United States during the calendar year 1895 is estimated to have been 2,254,760 fine ounces of gold, of the value of \$46,510,000, and 55,727,000 fine ounces of \$31,445,000, and the coinage of \$72,051,000. The estimated production of these metals throughout the world during the same period was \$,888,821 fine ounces of gold, amounting to \$200,285,700 in value, and 23,189,219 fine ounces of silver, of the commercial value of \$110,654,000. The total coinage at the mints of the United States during the isseal year ended June 30, 1896, amounted to \$71,188,468,57, of which \$53,878,490 was in gold coins, and \$12,309,978,52 in standard silver dollars, subsidiary coins and minor coins. The number of National banks organized from the time the law authorized their creation was passed, up to October 31, 1896, was 5,051, and of this number 3,579 were at the date last mentioned in active operation, having authorized capital stock of \$50,014,886, held by 288,92 shareholders, and circulating notes amounting to \$221,412,620.

The total outstanding circulation notes of all National banks on the 21st day of October, 1895, amounted to 234,553,807, including unredeemed, but fully secured notes of banks insolvent and in process of iquidation. The increase in National banks was last reported, the total resources of the 3,679 active institutions was \$3,253,-85,313.83.
