When he reached the mine he began the work of dislodging a large piece of roof coal. A blast was fired but this failed to move the mass as did repeated strokes from the drill. The mine foreman

"Let it alone, Edward," he said; "you have enough coal down for today, any-how." Lewis said "all right" and carelessly he struck the mass a slight tan. not with the intention of bringing it down, but imply as a good-natured farewell to the work. 
