STILL ANOTHER **CUBAN RESOLUTION**

Mr. Mills, of Texas, Introduces a Measure in the Senate.

OTHER MATTERS ARE CONSIDERED

Half Dozen Bills Are Taken from the Calendar -- Numerous Measures Are **Considered Without Definite Ac**tion -- The House Enters Upon Discussion of Pacific Railroad Funding Bill.

Washington, Jan. 7 .- A joint resolution was introduced in the senate today by Mr. Mills, of Texas, declaring that the expediency of recognizing the independence of a foreign goverment belongs to congress, and that the president shall act in harmony with congress; also declaring that "the independence of Cuba ought to be, and is hereby recognized," and appropriating \$10,000 for the salary and expenses of a minister to the government of Cuba. The bill lies on the table for the pres ent, and Mr. Mills is to speak on it next Monday.

Some half dozen bills were taken from the calendar and passed, including one to pay Samuel C. Reed, jr., son of Captain Reed, of the famous privateer General Armstrong, \$16,396 being the unexpended balance of the appropriation of \$70,739, made in 1881 as indemnity for the destruction of the privateer by the British in the neutral harbor of Fayal, in 1815.

An effort was made by Mr. Sherman of Ohio, to have consideration of senate bill fixing a uniform standard of classification and grading of wheat, corn, oats, barley and rye. Much opposition was developed to it, and the bill was not taken up.

The house bill for the appointment of a non-partisan commission to collect information and to consider and recommend legislation to meet the problems presented by labor, agriculture and capital was reached on the calender, and was antagonized by Mr. Aldrich, of Rhode Island, as "the most chimerical idea ever presented to the American congress." The morning hour expired without action being taken on It, and the bill remains on the calendar. The unfinished business being the bill extending the principle of the homestead laws to all lands acquired from Indian tribes, was taken up and was opposed in a long speech by Mr. Platt, of Connecticut. It was advocated by Mr. Stewart, of Nevada, who charac terized the opposition to it as "pitiful higgling." The bill went over without action.

A resolution was offered by Mr. Morgan, of Alabama, and agreed to, directing the committee on expenditures in .the executive department to inquire into the circumstances of the abstrac tion of certain papers as to Pacific Railroad matters from the files of the treasury depratment, as contained in a communication from that department last Tuesday.

HOUSE DISCUSSION.

The house today, under the terms o the order passed last month, entered upon the discussion of the Pacific Railroad funding bill. Mr. Powers, of Vermont, chairman of the committee and Mr. Grow, of Pennsylvania, supported the measure and Messrs, Hubbard, of Missouri, and Bell, of Texas, opposed it. The latter and Mr. Harri-
