



CONSIDERING THE CABINET TIMBER

The Organization Will Probably Be Effected This Week.

HANNAH WANTS TO BE SENATOR

Will Make No Effort for the Place Unless Senator Sherman Goes Into the Cabinet -- Mr. Collom is Now Considered a Possibility -- Eastern Men Who May Be Offered the Portfolio of Secretary of State.

Cleveland, O., Jan. 10 .- Major Mc-Kinley attended church this morning The division of the license fees has and later enjoyed a long drive. He will leave for Canton in the morning and expects to remain there till the first of March.

Major McKinley said to a friend to day that this week would be an impor-tant one in the process of organizing his cabinet and administration. The formation of the cabinet hinges upon the salient and pivotal positions of sec retary of state and secretary of the treasury. It is quite probable that both of these important cabinet port-folios will be tendered and accepted by the end of the week. Senator Sherman

has had some communication with Ma-jor McKinley, and he will go to Canton whenever the president-elect desires him to, and his visit will, according to present arrangements nere, be about the middle of the week. It is now pretty well established that Major Mc-Kinley wants Sherman to be secretary of state, but it is by no means certain that Mr. Sherman has made up his mind to accept a cabinet appointment. His inclination is to remain in the senate, where the work is systematized and familiar, and where he can regulate the amount and quality of it to a considerable extent. He feels no strong desire, said one of his friends of long standing today, to undertake the severe and exacting task of the most important and difficult governmental de partment. But, on the other hand, he has had long experience as chairman of the committee on foreign relations and many of his most valued friends are earnestly urging him to close his notable public career by a brilliant ad-as brigadier in command of the first mission of the department of state.





The measure carries with it an appropriation of \$1,000,000 annually, Prof. John Hamilton, deputy secretary of agriculture, has drafted an act that is thought meets with executive approval. The professor has given much thought to the road question and thinks his measure is just what the people want. He declines to make public its features until after it has been turned into the legislature.

Anticipating a demand on the part of the legislature for information of a reliable charter on the road question, and more especially in relation to the present status of the general and

local road laws of the state, Professor Hamilton has had ex-Senator A. D. Harlan of Contesville, make an examination into the road laws of Pennsylvania and to prepare a digest of ali such laws as have not been repealed Senator Brown has also prepared new primary election law, which will e made a part of the Quay reform

legislation. The main feature of the bill is a provision making it the duty of the officers of the general election to conduct the primaries.

Senator James G. Mitchell, of Jefferson, is working on a bill to reorganize the department of factory inspection so as to bring bake shops in cities and small factories under its supervision. His colleague, Representative W. O. Smith, has a bill amending the libel laws which the thinks ought to become a law. Mr. Smith is a newspaper pubthe profession in this tate for his measure, ure. The compulsory education law will likely be amended to cure certain defects and the department of public instruction will try to secure the pass-age of a bill establishing township high schools and making a special appro-

priation for their support. FIGHT AGAINST BOOK TRUST. Senator Arthur Kennedy, of Alle gheny, will renew the old fight against the "school book trust." He is chairman of the special committee to investigate the public school system and has prepared two bills, the aim of which is the publication and sale of all text books by the state. Investigations of previous sessions of the legislature recealed that many thousands of dollars can be saved by the issuance of books under state supervision. Senator Kennedy believes such a step will be in the

direction of reform and will bring to an end a monopoly to compels the schools to pay very high prices. The legislature will probably adopt the suggestion in the governors message for a new congressional, senato rial and legislative apportionment Lieutenant Governor Lyon thinks the people want a new division and he is in favor of giving it to them. He declares, however, that a congressional opportionment is not so much of a necessity as the state gets her full representation by having two members of congress-at-large. If a new apportionment is made Philadelphia and Pittsburg will each get another congressman. Allegheny county will also gain another senator and four representatives if the senatorial and legislative districts are changed. Philadelphia

will also come in for several new members. The Raines law, of New York, covering the granting of liquor licenses and the regulation of saloons, will be pre-sented with some modifications to the legislature early in the session in order to hurry its passage. The chief fea-tures of the Raines bill is that all liquor

Western Pennsylvania enacted two years ago were the "Greater Pittsburg" bills which had for their object the consolidation of Pittsburg, Allegheny and the outlying district in Allegheny county. The Supreme court has since decided certain provisions of the law unconstitutional. Public sentiment is opposed to the acts in general and in deference to this feeling Senator William Flinn, of Allegheny, who stood sponsor for the bills, has already introduced a general act repealing them. The bills will be repealed much easier than they Wanbaugh. were passed.

BIG FIRES AT BUFFALO. Lumber Yard of Maines & Company.

Three Firemen Are Overcome With Smoke---Richmond Block.

Euffalo, N. Y., Jan. 10.-The large lumber yards of Haines and company were discovered on fire at four o'clock this afternoon. The yards are bounded by Erie and River streets, the Colt Slip and the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad tracks. The flames spread quickly and in response to a second alarm the fire apparatus in the southern section responded and were reinforced by the fire tugs. While the fire was prevented from spreading fur-ther the utmost efforts of the department were powerless to entirely subdue the flames and up to 1 a. m. the firemen were at work on the place.

There is \$150,000 worth of lumber in the yard and this is in sured for \$120,-The loss is estimated at \$50,000 Three firemen were overcome by smoke and had to be taken to the hospital. Fire broke out in the Richmond block

I six o'clock this evening and damaged the building and contents to the extent of \$150,000. The building is a five story structure located at the corner of Seneca and Ellicott streets. It is occupied by the clothing firm of Altmand company. The retail department is on the first floor and the other four floors are used to store surplus stock. Nearly \$200,000 worth of stock was in the building and it was more or least damaged by fire and water. The in-

surance on the stock is \$175,000. The building is owned by J. M. Richmond and is fully insured. The fire started in the northeast end of the building on the fourth floor in piles of clothing near the elevator shaft
