New Phase of the Pacific Railroad Problem Presented.

FREE HOMESTEAD BILL IS PASSED

The Measure Is Amended in a Very Important Particular -- Business in the House Is Transacted with Despatch -- The Oleomargarine Bill 1s Opposition.

Washington, Jan. 14 .- A new phase of the Pacific railroad problem was presented in the senate today in the form of a resolution offered by Mr. Morgan, of Alabama, instructing the judiciary committee to inquire whether by the very fact that certain of the bonds of the Union and Central Pacific Railroad companies had fallen due and were not paid, the property of those companies had not become and was not now the property of the United States. The resolution went over without ac-

A resolution was offered by Mr Chandler, of New Hampshire, and was agreed to instructing the committee on interstate commerce to inquire into th agreement recently made by the managers of the lines of steamers on the great lakes to maintain the rates established by the joint traffic associa-

The house bill for free homesteads on the public lands in Oklahoma territory which has been the "unfinished business" in the senate since the first week of the present session, came to vote today after three hours debate and was passed, yeas 35; nays 11. It was first amended a very important particular, by that all settlers on these lands shall be entitled to patents, on payment of the usual and customary fees, and that no further charge of any kind shall be required. It also provides, by another senate amendment, that all sums of money so realized, which if not released, would belong to any Indian tribe, shall be paid to such tribe by the United States. The bill now goes back to the house for action on the senate amendments.

An effort was then made by Mr. Morgan, of Alabama, to get up the Nica-ragua canal bill and to make it the unfinished business, but there was no quorum voting on his motion, and the senate at 4.30 adjourned until Mon-

BUSINESS IN THE HOUSE.

When the house met this morning many members waited impatiently in their seats for business to begin. Each had a printed copy of some bill in his hand, eagerly hoping to get it through under the unanimous consent rule. When the journal had been read, a score of members were on their feet crying for recognition and business went along merrily for a while. A number of private pension bills and other minor bills were passed, among them one granting a pension to Mary S. Higgins, of Johnstown, Pa., Widow of Colonel Jacob S. Higgins, a veteran of the Mexican and civil wars.

The eleomargarine bill was taken up and passed by the house. Considerable opposition was developed but it did not prove formidable on the yea and nay vote on the third reading, which the opponents of the measure accepted as final. The yeas were 126 and the nays 96. Some amendments to perfect the measure were agreed to without opposition. The bill makes oleomargarine and other imitation dairy products subject to the laws of the state or territory into which they are transported.

The remainder of the day was spent by the house in transacting routing business under the unanimous consent rule and at 4.50 the house adjourned

Dr. Benjamin Lee, of the state board of health said that the disease is the same as the great plague of the middle ages, the black death and Manhattan Ele. 88 894 plague said to have been discovered in was probably due to the conditions was probably due to the conditions under which the people lived at that time. Should a case be dis overed, the usual course for infectiou diseases would be observed, as th plague is both infectious and contagious-that is, isolation of the patien and a complete disinfection and routing out of the place wherein it was dis covered. The supposed case reported in New York was probably brough there by a sailor from the east. Th Bubenie seeurge broke out in Chma about a year ago and has steadily worked its way westward and is now raging flercest in Bombay, where th inhabitants of the city are fleeing by thousands.

In June last, at a meeting of militar surgeons held in this city, two paper were read on this plague by two physicians who had just returned from China, where they had studied it b the bedside of patients. Its symptom are the same in all cases. It begin with a high fever, followed by sensation of aching in the bones. The comes the swelling of the glands as over the body, which is the distinctly feature of the malady, and which ge erally ends in abscesses and boils. extremely destructive to life,
