WOLCOTT'S BILL IS INTRODUCED

Murphy's Bill Providing for a New Custom House for New York Is Reported Favorably -- Army Appropriation Bill Passed in Senate Without Question or Remark .- A Number of Bills Approved in the House.

Washington, Jan. 18,-In the senate today Mr. Peffer, of Kansas, presented a memorial from his state, proposing that the power of the supreme court shall be so limited as to require the court, in case of an intended decision an advance copy of its decision, as in congress may have the right by a twothirds vote, to affirm the constitutionality of the act.

Senator Murphy's bill for a new custom house building in New York, was reported back favorably and placed on the calendar. The present custom house site is to be used, and the limit Jan. 20. of cost is to be \$5,000,000. The building commissioners are to be Charles N. Taintor, George B. Post, Hugh J. Grant and James T. Kilbreth.

The bill to provide for a representation of the United States by commissioners at any international monetary conference was introduced and is to be taken up tomorrow without reference to a committee. It is known as Senator Wolcott's bill, but in the absence of that senator in England, it was introduced by Mr. Chandler, of New Hampshire.

The army appropriation bill, appropriating over \$23,000,000, was passed without question or remark. There were a few minor amendments which will probably be concurred in by the house without the formality of a con-Terence.

The Nicaraguan canal bill was taken up and made the unfinished business and after a two hours' speech in support of it by Mr. Morgan, of Alabama the senate at 5.15 p. m. adjourned until tomorrow.

The rise durng the first hour of trading was equal o 1522% per cent., Lackawanna, Jersey Central, Sugar, Manhattan and the Grangers leading. The demand for stocks abated during the afternoon and at the ame time traders began to reduce their lines. The result was a general decline of \(^1482^14\) per cent., Manhattan leading, Wheeling and Lake Eric Preferred dropped from 13 to 10%. The heaviness of the bituminous coalers is due to the unsat-isfactory condition of the trade. Sugar jumped to 118 at the opening and later settled back to 116. In some quarters the afternoon selling was attributed in part to the Kentucky bank failures.
