The men at once saw that something was wrong, and followed the dog, which still carried the boot. When the tree was reached Reegan explained that the dog had after hard work, succeeded in nulling off his boot and taking it away Reegan was soon extricated from his perilous position,

LEHIGH VALLEY AFFAIRS.

Business at the Annual Meeting of Stockholders at Philadelphia. Philadelphia, Jan. 19.—The annual neeting of the stockholders of the Lehigh Valley Hallroad company was heloday in Musical Fund hall. It was one of the briefest meetings in the company's history, fasting but twenty minutes. President Elisha P. Wilbur and the old board of directors were reelected and the annual report, which has been published, was approved. William E. Lockwood, who is a prominent figure at all railroad meetings is Philadelphia, generally in the role of objector, offered several resolutions which were referred to the incoming management. But for Mr. Lockwood's participation in the harmonious proceedings, the meeting would probably not have lasted over five minutes. One of the resolutions introduced by him provided for the organization of an executive committee of either five or seven members and of which the president of the company should be chairman. He declared that railroad men of talent were getting scarcer every day. In fact they were dying at a tremendous rate and all because they were being worked too hard. By organizing the executive committee the responsibility would be divided. Another resolution authorized the newly elected officers to erect, if they thought proper, a loco-motive testing plant.
