PATCH CASE TAKEN
FROM THE JURY
Judge Gunster Directs a Compulsory
Non-Suit.

NO NEGLIGENCE ON THE CITY'S PART
City Solicitor Torrey So Contents
and Court Sustains Him—Change
of Plans After Award of Contract
Brings on a Dispute—The Big
Ejectment Case is Still On—Coun-
cilmian Gilroy Taps the City
Treasury for \$550.

When the plaintiff's side rested yester-
day in the damage suit of Mary E.
Patch against the city of Scranton,
City Solicitor Torrey forthwith moved
for a non-suit on the ground that there
had been an insufficiency of evidence
to show that the city was in any wise
guilty of negligence. Mr. Super found
the motion vigorously, but Judge Gun-
ster sustained Mr. Torrey's contention
and directed that a compulsory non-suit
be recorded, with rule to show cause
why verdict should not be stricken off,
returnable at the next term of argu-
ment court.

Schiffel was called before Judge Gun-
ster yesterday afternoon. Mr. Jones seeks
to recover a balance of \$1,600.00 due for
the erection of the building at 414
