Bill Advocating Its Erection Passed in the Senate.

TURPIE ATTACKS NICARAGUA BILL

Time of the House Consumed in Discussion of the Yost-Tucker Election Contest -- A Vote Upon the Case to Be Taken Today--Bill Is Passed Authorizing the Secretary of War to Recognize the Services of War Telegraphers.

Washington, Jan. 20 .-- The senate passed today the bill for the crection of a new custom house building in New York on the site of the present building, at a cost not exceeding \$5,000,000; appropriating \$250,000 for one year's rental of temporary premises, and appointing at a salary of \$5,000 each a board of five building commissioners. Mr. Turple, of Indiana, continued his onslaught on the Nicaragua canal bill, speaking for two hours and leaving his speech still unfinished. He likened the securities offered by the company for the hundred millions of concession by the government to bogus mortgages and to Peter Funk securities; and quoted the figures of the company's estimate of costs and of the engineers estimate to prove what he termed "the enormity of suppression" practiced by the company. The legislative appropriation bill was then taken up and finlshed; and a house bill of last session relleving foreign vachts from tonnage charges was taken up and passed.

DISCUSSION IN THE HOUSE. The consideration of a contested election case gave the house today an opportunity to indulge in some political discussion as relating to elections in Virginia. It was that of Jacob Yost vs H. H. St George Tucker from the Tenth district of Virginia, for possession of a seat in the 54th congress. The majority of the committee on elections No. 3 and the Republican members recommended that Tucker be permitted to retain his seat. Messrs. Walker, of Virginia and Thomas, Michigan, reported that Yost was entitled to the seat. The point in dispute was as to the counting of certain "imperfect" ballots which the state law declared should be thrown out. If they were counted Yost would have a small majority; if not Tucker would have a small majority. The ma-



They were referred to the finance committee to consult with the borough attorneys. Burgess Howard's veto of the police ordinance was then read. Mr. Flynn introduced an ordinance for the purpose of taxing all water and sewer in the borough after March, 1897, It passed first reading. Adjourned.
