Preparations for the Big Convention to Be Held in San Francisco.

Harrisburg, Pa., Jan. 21 .- This afternoon a meeting of the executive committee of the state Christian Endeavor Union was held in one of the parlors of the Commonwealth Hotel. Rev. Dr. Allan B, Philputt, of Philadelphia, a president of the union, presided. The arrangements for the transportation of the states representatives to the big San Francisco international convention next July, and the program for the state convention at Easton in September were discussed, Rev. Mr. Stonesifer headed the 1897 convention committepresent from Easton and enlightened the members of the executive committee on the work already accomplished by the Easton endeavorers for a successful convention.
