REFERS TO DEFIANCE OF OLNEY

The Matter of the Arbitration Treaty Is Brought Upon the Tapis -- Mr. Hoar Objects to the Intemperate Zeal Manifested in Favor of Ratification of the Treaty -- The Credentials of Boies Penrose Received.

Washington, Jan. 22.-Questions of deep interest and importance came up before the senate today in a most unexpected manner. First arose the subject of the recognition by congress of the republic of Cuba, Mr. Turple, of Indiana, giving notice of his intention to call up Senator Cameron's resolution on Monday next and to address the senate on the subject. Mr. Turple adverted to Secretary Olney's defiance of congress in the matter of Cuba and said that it reminded him of the school master of antiquity who "whipped his pu-pils generally." He also referred to a newspaper statement of an alleged compact yesterday between the present secretary of state and the premier of the next administration that there would be no action in relation to Cuba during the present congress. statement was bluntly contradicted by Senator Sherman as one without the slightest foundation. "There had been" he declared, "no conversation at all between us on the subject matter, no expression of opinion.

After this episode the question of the arbitration treaty was brought upon the tapis in an equally informal and chance matter. Mr. Cullom, of Illinois, had earlier in the day, sent to the clerk's desk for publication in the record a large number of letters which he had received on the subject of the treaty. some favoring and others objecting to the ratification. Mr. Hoar, of Massachusetts, presented other memorials on the same subject and took opportunity of lecturing a great many of the "wisest and best men in all parts of the country" for what he called their "intemperate zeal" in favor of ratification of the treaty. He reminded them that the treaty was still in progress of negotiation and that it was poor diplomacy, while the matter was still inchoate to oned utterances come from the pulpit. Brass, Guinea Coast, Jan. 22.-News has just been received here that the expedition sent by the Royal Niger company against the Emir of Nupe, from Lokoja, found the Foulah army of 500 Haussa troops, six Maxim rapidfire guns, twenty-six mounted European officers and 900 carriers. It was headed by the governor, Sir George Goldle, and was accompanied by the Royal Niger company's flotilla of armed stern-wheeled steamers.

The quarrel between the powerful Emir of Nupe and the Niger company is an old one and arose from the Emir's raiding the company's territory slaves. The Foulah force at Kabba was estimated to amount to 20,000 foot and 2,000 cavalry.


