THE PEACE TREATY TO BE REPORTED

Vote Was Six to Four in Foreign Relations Committee.

TWO IMPORTANT CHANGES MADE All Reference to King Oscar as Final Arbitrator Is Stricken Out -- A Provision That Qenstions of Foreign or

Domestic Policy Shall Not Be Subject to Arbitration, Except by a 1857. He was admitted to the bar, and Special Agreement.

Washington, Jan. 31 .- Every member of the senate committee on foreign relations, with the exception of Mr. Turple, was present Saturday morning when the committee convened a few minutes before 11 o'clock to consider the general treaty of arbitration between the United States and Great Britain, and agree upon a report for submission to the senate on Monday, At 1.29 p. m. a vote was taken on the treaty, with certain amendments, and a favorable report was ordered made to the senate on Monday.

The most important amendment was H. Sheridan, and on the promotion of its colonel, Gordon Granger, Alger that which added at the end of Article I, the following words: "But no question which affects the foreign or domes-Landing to induce Governor Blair to tic policy of either of the high contract-ing parties or the relations of either appoint Sheridan, the acting commiswith any other state or power, by treaty or otherwise, shall be subject to arbitration under this treaty except by a special agreement." This amendment, the committee believes, will cover the Monroe doctrine and the Nicaragua canal

The second amendment strikes out all reference to his Majesty the King of Sweden and Norway as the umpire in case the court fails to agree upon an umpire. The motion to strike out this clause was carried with but one negative vote, that of Senator Gray, of Delaware

THE FINAL VOTE.

The vote on the final motion to report the treaty to the senate as amended was so close that it startled some of the friends of the convention, who believed there would be practically no opposition to the amended treaty. When the roll was called the votes were cast as follows: In favor of reporting the treaty to the senate-Messrs, Sherman, Davis, Frye, Lodge, Cullom (Republicans), and Gray (Democrat). Total, 6. Against reporting the freaty to the senate-Messrs. Morgan, Mills, Daniel (Democrats), and Cameron (Republican). Total, 4.

It was decided that the treaty should be called up in the senate at the earliest day possible. The question of its consideration in open session was discussed informally. It is understood that while the members of the committee believe that such a motion may prevail, if made, no member of the committee will initiate it. This motion, however, will receive some votes from the membership of the committee.


