BIG WRANGLE OVER THE MITCHELL BILL

Very Lively Debate in the House of Representatives. SMITH'S SUBSTITUTE CAUSES WAR

Proposition to Place the Affair in the Hands of Philadelphia Judges Meets with Strong Opposition--Investigating Committees Scored by Mr. Coray, of Luzerne--The Measure Passed with the Bliss Amendment.

Harrisburg, Pa., Feb. 1.--It was twenty minutes after nine when Speaker Boyer rapped the house to order tonight.

Several petitions were read asking the passage of the bill to prevent the desecration of the American flag.

Mr. Holles, Philadelphia--Appropriating \$2,000 to the Mead-Chirurgical hospital of Philadelphia; also appropriating \$10,000 to the Master Builders' Mechanical Trades school of Philadelphia.

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DASTARDLY PLOT TO BLOW UP A JAIL

The Mystery Surrounding the Escape of William Shaffer Explained. WAS PLANNED BY "TERRIBLE PETE"

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Feb. 1.--Peter Valaska, alias Peter Vassil, a daring criminal, better known as "Terrible Pete," who was convicted in April last for the murder of Charles Cuperavage, was brought into court today for sentence.

Next in order was to prepare for the explosion. This was to be set off in the front entrance of the prison, under Warden Boland's private apartments.

Mr. Stewart, Philadelphia, opposed the bill to secure interest on deposits, and the original resolution drawing interest intended to hinder proposed legislation.

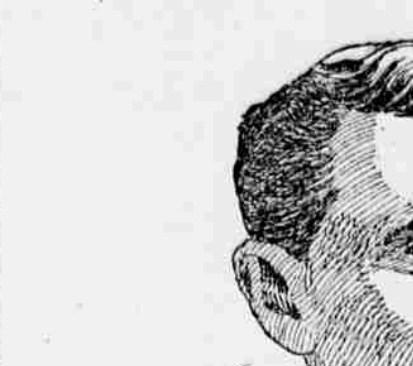

GUNBOATS FOR SIAM. WAR ON CHRISTIANS.

Prompt Measures Taken to Protect Americans in the Land of the White Elephant--Story of Riots. Muslims Murder Ten of Them Outside Heraklion--Raids in Which Christian Towns Are Plundered.

Washington, Feb. 1.--United States Minister John Barrett, at Bangkok, Siam, has been instructed by Secretary Olney to press for a reference of the assault on Vice Consul General Kellie to a mixed tribunal and for a prompt hearing.

Berlin, Feb. 1.--Dispatches have been received here from Bangkok stating that Herr Kempermann, the German minister to Siam, has been attacked in the streets by a Siamese mob, who defied the efforts of the police to quell their rioting.
