FORTY-FIVE STATES REPRESENTED

Washington, Feb. 5.-The vacancy which has existed in the senate since the fourth of March, 1896, by reason of Delaware legislature's failure to elect a senator from that state was filed today by the admission of Richard R. Kenney, whose credentials, in due form. were presented by Mr. Gray, of Delaware, and were accepted as prima facie evidence of his right to the seat. Even Senators Chandler, of New Hampshire, and Hoar, of Massachusetts, recognized Mr. Kenney's right to be sworn in and to take his sent; suggesting, however, that the question of whether the Delaware legislature which had elected him was a fraudulent body could be hereafter presented to the committee on privileges and elections. Meanwhile Mr. Kenney holds the seat, and the 45 states of the Union are now fully represented in the senate by 90 senators.
