

# DEFINES WHAT HE WILL WORK FOR

Is an Ardent Advocate of the Extension of Our Foreign Commerce By New Waterways, an Enlarged Navy. a Restored Merchant Marine and

Philadelphia, Feb. 28 .- The address of Senator-elect Penrose in Philadelphia on Friday evening, made in recognition of the complimentary banquet tendered to him by the Pennsylvania Republican league, was admirable in both style and substance. After a modest disclaimer of personal claim to public honor, the speaker dwelt at length upon the special needs of Philadelphia to which he pledged attention at Wash ington. First among these he blaced the improvement of Philadelphia harbor and the Delaware channel so as to admit to wharfage the largest ocean vessels and the biggest battleships. He argued for a navy yard at Philadelphia, and for such an increase in the navy as will materially promote the restoration of the American merchant marine, and dedicated his best energies as senator to the accomplishment of these results.

These special references to Philadel phla needs be justified upon the ground that in his election Philadelphia had gained its first direct senatorial representation in over sixty years. But, said he:




