Committee Reports a Bill Favoring the City of Philadelphia.

BUILDING COMMISSION MEASURE

Governor Appoints New Trustees of the Danville Insane Hospital .- Dr. Throop, of Scranton, Among the Number--Bills Passed in the Senate and House.

Harrisburg, Pa., March 2 .- In the senate this morning Senator Thomas' cap-itol removal bill was started on its way through the legislative mill. Just after the opening prayer, Mr. Brown, from the committee on judiciary special, arose and stated that he had been authorized by the committee to report as committed the bill providing for the removal of the capitol to Philadelphia and submitting the question to popular

All persons employed are to be Pennsylva-mians, and all material, so far as practi-

The bill does not specify the present capitol grounds as the sits for the new capitol, but this is probably due to an oversight. The bill is specify, ia requir-ing the more important votes of the com-mission to include all but two of the twelve legislators that would be on the twelve legislators that would be on the n, which is to consist of ilfteen members.


