ANTI-SALGON MOVEMENT.

It Is Discussed by the Methodist Ministerial Association.

The preacher who converts his pulpit into a political rostrum is a marked man. He said that conscientions men and women, though opposed to the saloon, could not all see it their duty to act with the third party.

And so, to give such persons an opportunity to work for temperance, he advocated the Anti-Saloon League, There should be a return to the strict discipline of the church, which was against the liquor traffic or indulgence in liquor or any abetting the business. The league dose not declare for any political party, but outlaws the vice. No man can be a loyal Methodist who is not a total abstinence man,

Several clergymen advocated the work of the league, as a movement in which Prohibitionists and non-political temperance men could join in the conflict against the traffic.
