Committee on Foreign Relations Will Meet on Wednesday.

MR. DOCKERY CRITICISES CONGRESS

The Representative from Missouri Attacks the 54th Congress for Its Expenditures -- Suggestions as to Future Appropriations.

Washington, March 7.-The senate week. The special session between now and the calling of the extra session of congress March 15 will be devoted to the consideration of nominations and nothing else, unless the general treaty of arbitration between the United States and Great Britain should be reported from the committee on foreign relations. It is not expected that President McKinley has his appointments so well in hand that he will be able to send in a batch every day. The cabinet has been confirmed and it is probable that the senate, after meeting tomorrow, will adjourn until Wednesday.



If the committee is able to agree Wednesday upon the treaty and the amendments, if any are considered to be necessary, the treaty will probably be discussed and some of the time of the senate consumed in the discussion of that convention. 




