CASE AGAINST THE PREACHER-EDITOR

Dr. Swallow Will Be Arraigned for Contempt.

SUITS TO BE HEARD THURSDAY

Servants About the Capitol Have Been Questioned by the Editor

Harrisburg, March 12.—The purpose in delaying the trial proceedings against Rev. Dr. Swallow is not to give him a chance to play the role of martyr and create sympathy.

Ex-Deputy Attorney General Stranahan, one of Swallow's lawyers, said this morning they were ready to proceed. He would not indicate what he had, but he is without fear. Dr. Swallow asked to have the case continued until June so that he could attend a Methodist conference.

HELLER-LAUBACH BILLS.

CHARLES O. KAISER'S TRIAL

Interesting Testimony Produced Against the Prisoner.

Norristown, Pa., March 12.—The trial of Charles O. Kaiser for the murder of his wife was continued today.

Chief of Police Rodenbaugh, of Norristown, was called to the stand and produced a purse which he found on Kaiser's person.

At the afternoon session the commonwealth, by the testimony of two detectives, proved that Kaiser had admitted to them that he knew who shot his wife.

THE POWERS PLAN TO COERCE GREECE

Admirals' Proposals Submitted to Their Governments.

BLOCKADE OF THE GREEK PORTS

Warships to Be Fired On, in Certain Cases to Be Fired On—Embargo on Crete's Coast—Hesitation on the Part of France—The Integrity of the Ottoman Empire Necessary to the Peace of Europe.

London, March 12.—It is asserted here on excellent authority that the powers are in agreement in regard to presenting a fresh note to Greece giving notice of their intention to resort to coercive measures to enforce their demands if Greece does not comply at once, and also to maintain a blockade of Greek ports.

The Powers, while united in principle have not yet been able to reach a solution of the Cretan question. Proposals and objections are being exchanged hourly.
