Washington, March 22.—The supreme court, by a majority opinion, rendered an important decision this morning sustaining the Sherman anti-trust law. The case was known as the government vs. the Trans-Misseuri Traffic association. Some time ugo the case was tried in the circuit court in Kansas, in which Judge Shiras sat, and it was decided in favor of the railroads and against the government. Soon after the Trans-Misseuri Traffic association dissolved, but the government carried the case to the United States court. An effort was made to have the case dismissed, as the association had dissolved. The supreme court however decided that the case must be heard, and it was argued, and today the decision was rendered overruling the lower court and sustaining the government. As the case was one under the anti-trust law, the decision sustains that law, and may have effect on other traffic associations.
