Many Surprises in Markets, but Few Losses.

Business Men Are Less Disposed Every Day to Throw Away Good In-

New York, March 26.-R. G. Dun & Co. will say tomorrow in their weekly Review of Trade:

Rarely have markets sustained such with so little loss. The railroads have been subjected to so much loss of late by cutting of rates, in spite of all associations, that the possibility of open and restricted competition, instead of agreements which restrict only the more honest may well have a sobering influence.
