

Various Measures Introduced in the House of Representatives.

FOR THE RELIEF OF MRS. KELLAR

Mr. Connell Introduces a Bill Pro-

viding for an Annuity of \$240 for the Widow of a Member of the National Guard -- Measures Approved by the Governor.

Harrisburg, Pa., March 21 .- Petitions containing several thousand signatures against the bill appropriating \$25,000 to St. Joseph's hospital, reading, were filed in the house to day by Representative Spatz and other members of the Berks delegation.

A large batch of memorials was filed in favor of the Smith bill for a more equitable distribution of the public school fund and the bill creating a state board of barbers.

A bill was introduced by Mr. Fredericks, of Clinton, supplementary to the act relating to the cost of registers of wills and orphens' court to apportion costs in cases of caveats and appeals; also to supplement to the arbitration act of June 15, 1836, to provide that "if party against whom any award shall be made as aforesaid, not being the party by whom the rule or reference was taken, shall apply by petition to a judge of the court in which such action is depending, and shall therefore set forth that by reason of poverty he is unable to pay the costs of the suit, or enter into a recognizance as aforesaid and shall make affidavit of such fact, it shall be lawful for such judge, after due notice to the opposite party, if he shall be satisfied of the truth of the statement in such petition, to make an order that the appeal of such party in the case shall be good, although the costs shall not be paid nor the recognizance entered into by him as aforesaid.


DEATH IN JUMPING ROPE.



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
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
