No satisfactory solution of his case has yet been offered. It is a question as to whether he will ever fully recover.

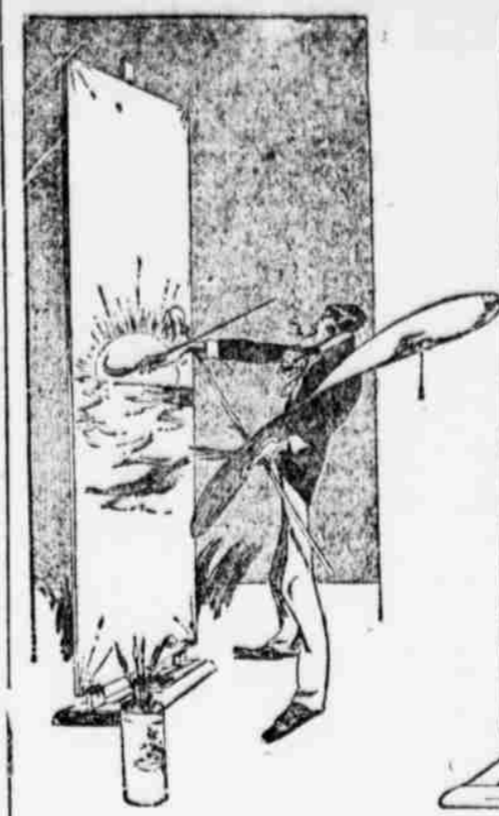

far as relates to increased activity in manufacturing and its reflex influences upon other lines of business until the new measure is not only upon the statute books, but has time to make itself felt and time is given for the absorption of the enormous quantity of foreign goods now being forced upon the market.

THE FREE IMPORTATIONS.

Mr. Dingley's remarks with reference to increased importations and the prospective effect in delaying the demand for the products of American manufactures suggest an examination of the official figures on this subject.

The free importations of dutiable goods have, as shown by the increase in importations of dutiable goods in the month of March, 1897, been greater than in any other month, with a single exception, since the early part of 1893, and the free importations for the present month seem likely to exceed those of the last month.
