

THE FREE IMPORTATIONS.

Mr. Dingley's remarks with refernce to increased importations and their prospective effect in delaying the demand for the products of Amer can manufactories suggest an exam nation of the official figures on this subject. They fully confirm his state-ments with reference to the great inrease in importations since it became known that an increase in tariff rates is to be had. This is especially true with reference to articles upon the free list, while the fact that the customs collections have doubled during The free importations in the them at. month of March, 1897, were greater than in any other month, with a single exception, since the early part of 1893. and the free importations for the present month seem likely to exceed those of the last month. The disposition to rush into the country articles now upon the free list is also shown in the per centage tables of the bureau of statistics, which indicate that the percentage of free importations increased very greatly the moment the result of the November election was known. In the 16 months prior to the November election, the importations had averaged only 46 per cent, upon the free list. Beginning with November, however, and continuing up to this time, more than 55 per cent, of the importations have been those upon the free list while the importations of dutlable goods have, as shown by the increase in customs receipts, also enormous!y
