FIFTH MONTH ENTERED UPON

Work Enough to Keep the Legislature Busy for Months.

ADJOURNMENT MAY BE MADE IN JUNE

Nearly Five Hundred Bills on the House Calendar for Second and Third Readings -- Keator Ballot Reform Bill Will Hardly Be Reached Before the Middle of May -- Capitol Commission to Meet.

Warrisburg, May 2.-The legislature enter upon the fifth month of the session with enough work to keep them going day and night for two months. There is no telling how long the session will last, although the general opinion is that it will extend far into June. A resolution will be offered in the house next Friday fixing June 1 for the final adjournment. This will be changed by the senate to June 12 and a compromise will probably be made for the 19th. The appropriation bills are still in committee and no provision has been made to meet the public expenses of the next two years. The direct inheritance tax bill continues on the revenue measure that has gone through the house and it is likely to be knocked out of shape in the sen-

There are nearly 500 bills on the house calendar for second and third readings. Two per cent, of these are senate measures. Besides there are twenty bills awaiting first reading. The senate calendars are practically cleared and if need be that body could adjourn June 1. The house is moving slowly and the result will be that late in the session many of its bills have to be dropped from the calendar to make room for those originating in the senate. The house rules commmittee will have a meeting to map out a pro-

gramme when Speaker Boyer returns The reform bills are still in the house fudiciary general committee in charge of a sub-communitiee. Chaleman Elkin, of the state Republican committee will tomorrow name a committee of the house and senate to take charge of the bills. The Keator ballot reform bill will hardly be reached before the middle of May. It is on the house calendar for third reading and final pass-

The Hamilton roads bill will be taken up by the house this week for third reading and final passage.

The capitol commission will meet on Menday night in the executive chamber to make the final preliminary arrangements for the erection of a new

FIRE AT GLEN LYON.

The Town Is Visited by a \$10,000 Conflagration.

Nanticoke, May 2.-A disastrous fire occurred in Glen Lyon, a mining town, five miles from Nanticoke today. It originated in Kennedy's hotel and that structure was entirely consumed, together with a large dwelling house and the bottling works, all the property of P. S. Kennedy. The fire was the work of an incendiary. The hose carrying the water to the flats were cut in three places, totally destroying their use and but for the heavy downpour of rain, the whole town would have

been destroyed. The fire originated under the lower stairway and the inmates narrowly escaped with their lives. The damage is over \$19,000, with light insurance.
