Senate Hears Report of the Philadelphia Committee.

SENATOR GRADY REFUSES TO SIGN

The Libel Bill Framed by the Pennsylvania State Editorial Association Passes Third Rending in the Heuse .- Bills Amending the Vaccination Act and Prohibiting the Adulteration of Malt Liquor Are Passed Finally.

Harrisburg, May 4.-In the senate this morning the bill providing for the appointment of meat inspectors passed finally, as did the bill providing that a liquor license shall not be issued to any person until a bond has been executed with two sufficient sureties or one title. insurance or trust company to be atproved by the court granting such it-

When the bill which gives the insurwhere commissioner the right to say whether the securities of foreign insurance companies wishing to do business in Pennsylvania is acceptable came up for final passage, quite a heated discussion was precipitated. A vote on final passage resulted in the passage of the bill by a vote of 26 to 17.

The senate met at 4.30 o'clock this afternoon to hear the report of the committee appointed at the request of the Citizens Municipal league, of Philndelphia by the senate two years ago for the purpose of inquiring into the operations of Philadelphia's Bulitt bill charter. The report was rather volu-minous, making about 110 typewritten Lieutenant Governor Lyon occupled the chair, and as soon as order was secured Chairman William H. Anhanded in the report. Chief Clerk Smiley began reading it, but after excreising his voice for a half hour, he gave way to Journal Clerk Kelty. Then Smiley and Kelty alternated until the report had been read, or rather until a portion of it had been read, for the clerks dropped a page or two at every opportune moment. Even at this rate nearly an hour and a half was

spent in reading the report.

The document was signed by Chairman Andrews, E. B. Hardenburgh, of Wayne; Arthur Kennedy, of Alle-gheny; S. J. McCarrell, of Dauphin, and C. Wesley Thomas, of Philadelphia, Senator Grady alone withholding his signature therefrom.

COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

The report is a voluminous document covering 109 pages of closely written typewritten matter and is estimated to contain between 42,000 and 45,000


