SOLDIERS' BILL PASSES SENATE

Union Veterans in Office Not to Be Removed Without Cause.

THE WEILER BILL PASSED FINALLY

Mr. Gould's Uniform Poor System Bill is Voted Down on Final Passage—The Sanitary Bake Shop Bill Goes Through at the End of a Brief Discussion—Measures Passed Finally.

Harrisburg, May 19.—In the absence of President Pro Tem McCarrill and Lieutenant Governor Lyon, Mr. Grady presided in the senate this morning.

The senate then proceeded with the consideration of bills on first and second reading. When the Stewart bill, providing for the interest on state funds, came up at first reading, Mr. Andrews asked that it be sent back to the finance committee. This was agreed to. The bill appropriating \$6,208.56 to pay the expenses of the Andrews Senatorial investigating committee passed second reading. The bill prohibiting the discharge from public office of union soldiers without reasonable cause passed finally, as did the bill authorizing the property owners of any street, of any town or village not incorporated to enter into control with light companies for lighting said street or water companies for furnishing water for fire protection.

The senate then adjourned until Monday evening.

SHINDEL'S EYE ON ALLEGHENY.

York's Candidate for Treasurer May Be Aided by W. A. Stone.

York, May 19.—The friends of Congressman William A. Stone, of Allegheny, are quietly booming Shindel for state treasurer at the nomination of James S. Beeson, of Westmoreland county, this year, would handicap Mr. Stone's gubernatorial candidacy next year.

Mr. Shindel hopes to recapture the whole thirty-eight votes from Allegheny, and in return next year Congressman Stone will be supported by this section of the state for governor.

DRAWN BATTLE IN TIoga.

Two Quay Delegates and Two Antis, with Hands Tied.

Wellsboro, May 19.—The fight in the county for delegates to the Republican state convention was amicably adjusted by the county committee today by the election of two Quay and two anti-Quay men, with the proviso that no delegate is empowered to issue a proxy. The delegates chosen are Andrew B. Hitchcock, Charles Orr, John L. Landrus and DeRos H. Walker. The two last named are Quay men.

EXCITING ELECTION.

Members of the Afro-American Republican League Again Become Very Boisterous in Their Meeting.

The civil service bill was this morning sent back to the house judiciary general committee for amendment. The reform committee appointed by State Chairman Elliot is working on amendments to meet the objections that have been raised to the measure. The committee has not yet been able to agree upon all the amendments, but expects to have them in shape to insert in time to bring the bill out early next week.

Mr. Gould, of Erie, called up a proposed bill making a uniform poor system throughout the state, except in counties containing a population of 20,000 or less, and secured unanimous consent to amend it to apply to the entire state. The bill was voted down on final passage by 91 to 45. Mr. Gould has been trying for two years to pass this bill, but he has never succeeded in getting it through the house. The objection to it comes from members from the smaller counties where the practice of "farming out" their poor is in vogue. Much of the time of the morning session was taken up in considering senate amendments to the house bills. The Weiler bill to protect employees of corporations in their right to form and join labor organizations passed finally, as amended by the senate. The measure now goes to the governor.

The first hour of the afternoon session was devoted to the consideration of senate amendments to house bills, none of which are of general interest. The remaining two hours was given up to passing bills finally.

BAKE SHOP BILL PASSED.

Mr. Woodruff, of Philadelphia, called up the sanitary bake shop bill and a brief discussion ensued, after which the measure went through. The bill now goes to the governor. These bills passed finally: Amending the act of June 8, 1887, by providing for the institution of mandamus proceedings in certain cases by the attorney general and for the remedy in the event of his refusal; to prevent the spread of contagious diseases known as yellow, black knot, peach rosette and pear blight among fruit trees; authorizing school directors and controllers to provide transportation for school children at the expense of the district in which the schools in which they reside or to the schools of neighboring districts; regu-

lating the expenses of county commissions in counties containing a population of 10,000 or over.

The house adjourned until tomorrow morning.
