UNIMPORTANT DAY IN LEGISLATURE

Large Batch of gubernatorial Vetoes Confronts the House.

ONE OF THE LEXOW BILLS KILLED

The Governor Does Not Propose to Sanction Any of the Minor Expense Accounts of the Andrews Committee Until He Determines Whether He Can Approve the Main Item—Eminent Domain for Trolley Companies

Harrisburg, May 20.—A protest from the board of managers of the Philadelphia Trades League was presented to the house this morning by Mr. Marshall, of Allegheny, against the Pittsburgh classification bill. Mr. Marshall also presented a memorial from the league praying for the defeat of the senate bill providing that corporations shall not undertake or perform any business or purpose of existing corporations without first acquiring their franchises and property. He also presented a petition from the United Labor League, of Western Pennsylvania, in favor of the Muchlbrunner bill prohibiting the use of power-driven machinery in prisons, work-houses and reformatories. Memorials were filed from local and Pomona granges all over the state in favor of the Pennsylvania state tax conference bill.

GOVERNMENTAL VETOES.

A communication was received from the governor giving notice of his disapproval of these bills: Enlarging the competency of the wife to testify against her husband; authorizing the publication of 10,000 copies of the report of the "Indian forts" commission; providing for the incorporation of companies to carry on the business of a pawn broker and the lending of money on the security of personal and real property at the rate of 1 per cent. interest monthly.

OTHER PROCEEDINGS.

The Woodruff bill prohibiting city officials and councilmen from holding any office of profit passed second reading. A resolution was offered by Mr. Bary, of Huntingdon, and adopted commending the action of the president and congress on the Cuban question. A large number of bills passed second reading during the afternoon session. The Young bill giving trolley companies the right of eminent domain passed second reading after it had been amended.

AN OFFICER SHOT DOWN.

Albert Rodecker is Probably Fatally Wounded at Greenville. Greenville, May 20.—Special Pennsylvania Officer Alfred Rodecker, of Sharon, had been in this city all day on the lookout for a man named Gregory, for whom he had a warrant. Rodecker met his man in front of the National hotel. He attempted to arrest him, when Gregory pulled a revolver and shot point blank, the ball entering Rodecker's head just above the left eye.

KILLED IN A FREIGHT WRECK.

Train Ran Into an Open Switch with Serious Results. Costello, May 20.—A serious accident occurred here this morning. A freight train from Erie, Pa., was wrecked at the crossing near the Pennsylvania and Erie roads. The engine and several cars were derailed. One man was killed and several others injured.

DIED, AS SHE FEARED ARREST.

Poor Mother of Seven Children Committed Suicide. Easton, May 20.—In a fit of despondency because she was too poor to pay for some silver spoons she had bought of an installment house and fearing arrest, as some of the spoons were missing and could not be returned, Mrs. John W. Loh, of Freeburg, Pa., committed suicide. Her husband, the mother of seven children, took poison and died at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Bealer, in this city. She left a note explaining the cause of her suicide.

DOMESTIC WEDS WEALTH.

Penrose-Corcoran Marriage Stirrs Up Controversy. Coatesville, Pa., May 20.—The marriage of J. Norman Penrose, son of the late Hon. James Penrose, to Miss Julia Corcoran, created a big stir in society circles here.

OVER AN EMBANKMENT.

Husband and Wife Seriously Hurt and Horse Killed. Shrewsbury, Pa., May 20.—A. S. Powell, a veteran of the late war, living in Kinsman, near here, was perhaps fatally hurt and his wife seriously injured by being thrown out of a buggy near Orangeville. His skull was fractured and the flesh nearly all torn off one leg. They fell over an embankment, a distance of 50 feet. The horse was killed outright.

TAKE CARE OF THE EAR.

Substance of an Important Paper Read Before State Doctors. Pittsburg, May 20.—The feature of tonight's meeting of the State Medical Society was the reading of a paper by Dr. Louis J. Lautenbach, of Philadelphia, on "The Necessity for Active, Not Passive, Treatment in Ear Diseases." The speaker laid special stress upon the contention that by paying close attention to the ear chronic cases can often be materially improved and relieved, advocating that upon the evidence of any ear trouble it should be thoroughly examined and if the physician feels himself incompetent to take charge of the case he should refer it to some one whom he knows will do justice to it. What he protested against most strongly is the neglect of the family physician to give proper weight to the symptoms of ear disease in their incipient stage. A thorough treatment would dissipate the pathological condition. The address was received with much attention.

PREPARING TO STRIKE.

A General Tie-Up of Bituminous Mines is Now Threatened. Pittsburg, May 20.—In accordance with the action taken at the miners' national convention recently held at Columbus, O., the miners of the Pittsburg district are preparing for a general strike for the restoration of the 40-cent rate. The miners' officials are reticent, but it is understood that the strike will take place about the first week in June. There are twenty-three thousand miners in the district, but it is not believed that all of them will strike. Pending the general strike the miners have been notified to stop all individual strikes and to return to work until the general strike is ordered.
