UNIMPORTANT DAY IN LEGISLATURE

Large Batch of Gubernatorial Vetoes Confronts the House,

ONE OF THE LEXOW BILLS KILLED

The Governor Does Not Propose to Sanction Any of the Minor Expense Accounts of the Andrews Committee Until He Determines Whether He Can Approve the Main Item .- Eminent Domaiu for Trolley Companies

Harrisburg, May 20 .- A protest from the board of managers of the Philadelphia Trades league was presented to house this morning by Mr. Marshall, of Allegheny, against the Pitts-burg classification bill. Mr. Marshall presented a memorial from the league praying for the defeat of the senate bill providing that corporations shall not undertake or perform any business or purpose of existing corporations without first acquiring their franchise and property. He also presented a petition from the United Laber league, of Western Pennsylvania, in favor of the Muchibronner bill prohibiting the use of power-driven machinery in prisons, work-houses and reformatories, Memorials were filed from local and Pomona granges all over the state in favor of the Pennsylvania state tax conference bill.

The order of business in the house today was local and special bills on second reading. Beginning with next week night sessions will be held on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. All the local and revenue bills on the calendar were read the second time.

GUBERNATORIAL VETOES.

A communication was received from the governor giving notice of his disapproval of these bills: Enlarging the competency of the wife to testify against her husband; authorizing the publication of 10,000 copies of the report of the "Indian forts" commission; providing for the incorporation of companies to carry on the business of a pawn broker and the lending of money on the security of personal and real property at the rate of 1 per cent. interest monthly.

The governor also disapproved the current resolution authorizing the publication of 10,000 copies of the Lexow report. He states that to approve the resolution would be to piedge himself in advance to approve the appropriation asked for by the committee and on account of the expense incurred by the printing.

OTHER PROCEEDINGS.

The Woodruff bill prohibiting city officials and councilmen from holding any office of profit passed second reading. A resolution was offered by Mr. Bare, of Huntingdon, and adopted commending the action of the president and congress on the Cuban question. A large number of bills passed second reading during the afternoon session, The Young bill giving trolley companies the right of eminent domain passed second reading after it had been

AN OFFICER SHOT DOWN.

Albert Rodecker Is Probably Fatally Wounded at Greenville. Greenville, May 20 .- Special Pennsyl-

vania Officers Alfred Rodecker, of Sharon, had been in this city all day on the lookout for a man named Gregory, for whom he had a warrant. Rodecker met his man in front of the National hotel. He attempted to arrest him, when Gregory pulled a revolver and shot point blank, the ball entering Rodecker's head just above the left eye. Several bystanders saw the affair and gave chase, Gregory running up the street. Officer Melvin followed, shooting as he ran, and Gregory returned the shots. He turned down Penn ave-

nue and disappeared in the darkness. A little daughter of Samuel Callen was struck on the leg by one of the flying bullets and seriously injured. The affair happened while several hundred people were on the street.

The cow sunk her horns into the door several times, and had it not been for the timely arrival of men with clubs she would have forced her

After being beaten away she made a break and almost leaped through a window. The women of the house took refuge upstairs until the cow was firmly lassoed and bound to a tree.
