LONG LOOKED FOR PAY-DAY AT HAND

Appropriation Ordinance Passes Councils Without a Hitch.

STREET COMMISSIONER DUNNING

Democrats Oppose Kinsley's Removal, but When He is Only Removed, Vote for Dunning's Confirmation--The Select Branch Votes to Appeal from Judge Archbald's Decision in the New Assessment Case--Fight for the Sanderson Avenue Paving Contract.

Both councils met last night and passed the long-delayed appropriation ordinance; select council also confirmed the appointment of A. H. Dunning to the office of street commissioner.

Immediately after the meeting of select council was called to order Mr. Chittenden was made chairman in the absence of Colonel Sanderson and before the minutes were read, Mr. Manley suggested that the matter of the confirmation committee be taken out of the common council box and acted upon.

The communication of Clerk Mahon announcing the confirmation committee of the lower branch was read and then Chairman Chittenden appointed the committee unofficially named by President Sanderson, one week ago Wednesday.

It first went to common council where it was approved forthwith. It immediately came over to the selectmen and they also gave it immediate approval.

REMOVAL OF KINSLEY. The judiciary committee, or rather the Republican members thereof, submitted through Mr. Lansing a report approving the removal of C. R. Kinsley from the office of street commissioner.

A roll call resulted in the adoption of the resolution by a vote of 12 ayes to 7 nays, Messrs. Coyne and Manley being the only Democrats to vote aye. The vote was:

Ayes--Messrs. Ross, Finn, Thomas, Williams, Durr, Chittenden, Wagner, Manley, Fellows, Schroeder, Lansing, Coyne--12.

Nays--Messrs. Kearney, Clarke, Roche, McCann, Burns, Frable, McAndrew--7.

On the motion to confirm the appointment of A. H. Dunning, as Mr. Kinsley's successor, the Democrats reversed themselves with the exception of Mr. Manley and the vote for confirmation was eighteen ayes, one nay.

HELP FOR ASSESSORS. A communication was received from the board of city assessors asking for \$500 for clerk hire.

A resolution authorizing the assessors to proceed with the assessment and secure whatever help is necessary was referred to committee.

TO GIVE COURT LINES. A resolution was passed instructing the city engineer to run the street lines on Decker's court between North Main avenue and Hyde Park avenue and on Saddle court between Washington and Luzerne streets.
