MORE REFORM BILLS ARE SHOVED ALONG

They Are Expected to Pass Finally on Wednesday Next.

OTHER MEASURES PUSHED FORWARD

Prior to Adjourning Over Sunday the House Assumes an Industrious Mood and Pushes Forward a Raft of Bills of More or Less Merit.

Harrisburg, May 21.—Three reform bills were read the first time in the house this morning. They are the non-political assessment, non-political interference and the poll tax measures.

For Nearly \$3,000,000 Two Weldless Plants Are Transferred.

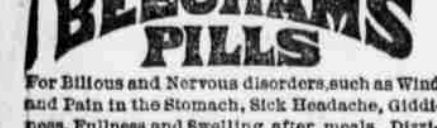
