House Bill Relating to Criminal Libel Passes First Rending.

NEW APPOINTMENTS IN THE STATE

A Woman Appointed as Notacy Public .- Bill Presented Making the Staughter of Unmuzzled Dogs Lawful -- Attorney General Gives an

Harrisburg, May 24.-This evening's session of the senate was devoted to the consideration of bills on first and second reading. Mr. Grady introduced a concurrent resolution which was passed, providing for the appointment by the governor of a committee of nine-three from the house and three from the senate; and three by the governor, to draft legislation for the repeal of existing laws, or for additional legislation upon the subject of insurance. The committee, which is to incur no expense, is to report at the next sesgion of the legislature. The resolution says that the appointment of this committee is warranted owing to the many new features that have been introduced into insurance business since the passage of the general insurance

A concurrent resolution was introduced and passed, providing for the printing of 10,000 copies of the report of the committee that investigated the riate treasury and the auditor gener-

From the committee on public roads and highways was reported the Hamfiton road bid, as amended. The amendment provides for an appropriation of \$500,060 instead of \$1,000,000. A concurrent resolution was passed providing for the attendance of the reception to be tendered to Major General Brooks on Thursday evening.

The Bare Cuban resolution was concurred in by the senate.

The house bill relating to criminal Hoel passed first reading and the act empowering water companies to acquire lands and water to preserve their water supply from pollution or contamination went through on second

These gubernatorial appointments were confirmed by the senate; Miss I. J. Baker, of Media, Delaware county; George A. Kemper, of Akron, Lancaster county, and W. J. R. Allen and James E. Clark, of Philadelphia, to be notaries public; Joel A. Gates, of White township, Cambria county, to be a justice of the peace.

"The Indians may or may not have a legal or equitable claim to the lands in question" he adds, "but am clearly of the opinion that neither the legislature nor the attorney general has any power to settle the disputed question of title between the present occupants on the one side and the indians on the other. Each owner is entitled to his day in court and to a full hearing and that right cannot be taken away from him either by the legislature or by any opinion the attorney general might ex-

Hawaii Will Give the British Company a Concesssion to Land.
