

BLOOMSBURG DYNAMITERS Trial of the Alleged Conspirators Is Now Under Way.

GRANT HERRING'S ADDRESS Some Things the Prosecution Expects to Prove.

Levi Waller the First Witness Examined--John Ertwein Hearing Threats, Kate Davis Also Gives Damaging Evidence Against Wintersteen.

Bloomsburg, May 26.--The Wintersteen dynamite trial got fairly under way today, and the hearing of testimony began this afternoon.

He reviewed the details of the dynamite explosion which wrecked Mr. Waller's house, stunned the inmates and startled the neighborhood. There was a craning of necks when the name of Clifton Knorr, who yesterday pleaded guilty to the charges against him, was called by Knorr's testimony that he was 26 years old in July, 1889. In answer to questions by District Attorney Graham, of Philadelphia, he said: "I have known Wintersteen ever since he entered my father's office about fifteen years ago. In the fall of 1889 I went to college and attended there for three years, but did not graduate. After leaving college, I stayed at home about a year, and then went to Reading. I know Levi Waller and remember when the bill in equity was filed. I was party to it, and was represented by Mr. Waller, Waller and Scarlet, were attorneys for my mother and my sister, Mildred.
